White Coal is the latest Australian discovery. It consists of felted cabbage fibers, like peat, which contain interspersed between them fine grains of sand. It is easily combustible, and burns with a bright flame. The white coal covers large tracts, requiring no mining, and is said to be already used to a large extent for fuel.

Cotton Manufacture in India .- A rival to English cotton factories is coming rapidly forward in India, where the raw material is cultivated. Ten years ago the first cotton factory was started in that country; to-day there are eleven first-class factories in operation in Bombay city and eight in the interior of that Presidency; in the Punjaub 84 factories, producing \$2,000,000 worth of goods annually; and at Surat, Broach, Almahabad, Cawnpore, Oude, and in the Mysore districts there are also many factories—the whole employing many thousands of operators. While cotton may be grown to an unknown extent in India, it is equally significant that labor is very cheap, and the natives show an extraordinary aptitude for its culture and
