amend the Act incorporating the Grand Southern Railway Company. This bill makes provision for seven directors instead of five, and gives power to five stockholders to call a meeting, the Trustees to borrow money instead of the corporation, authorizes the Company to run any locomotive instead being restricted to a coal-burning one, and proides for the construction to be commenced in five
