NICE BEAN PORRIDGE.-Take about two pounds of nice, sweet, well-cured corn beef; soak in cold water till sufficiently fresh ; then wash and rinse it. Then take about one-half pint of small, sound, ripe white beans ; wash and rinse them : put the meat and beans into about six or eight quarts of water, and boil moderately till the beef is done through. Take out the meat from the pot, which should stand in a cool place till the skimmings rise. Remove this fat, and place the pot again over the fire; bring it to the boiling point, and thicken with a little corn meal and boil again. To give it a good flavor, add some black pepper and nice sweet butter to suit the taste, and it is then ready to serve with crackers, white or brown bread, or corn meal johnny-cake, as choice or necessity may quired.
