soft cloth dipped in milk and water. Do not use oap. Rub dry with a handful of rags. The best bed-bug poison is a globule of mercury of about the size of a silver five-cent piece thoroughly mingled with the white of an egg, the last previously beaten to a forth. Stop all cracks with putty, both of the bed and of the surbase and floor-joints of the room, and apply the above mixture with a feather. There is no necessity of washing the bedstead for some time. After washng, however, repeat the above-described operation.

Save the inner white husks for mattrasses. Dry them in a clean, airy place. No need to strip them fine. Use them whole and they will answer the purpose better than straw.

In dealing with furniture, remember to keep water from everything soluble therein, oil from everything porous, alcohol from varnish, and acids from marble.
