Each man is allowed \$20 a year, with which he is expected to furnish two suits. The carriers were required to have their measures taken here and sent to Montreal, where the suits are made according to regulation standard.... The *Farmer*, whose account of the theft of money from Mr. John Atherton, of Fredericton, we gave last week, now says: "It seems that the guilty party is the 'servant girl' who has actually been found to have defrauded a portion of the money. The Police Magistrate sent her to jail for three months at hard labor.... There were 237 inmates of the Lunatic Asylum on the 31st of October last against 243 on the same date of 1874.... Mr. John Floyd, of Fairfield, St. Harris, raised the past season sixty-eight and a half bushels of marketable potatoes from one and a half bushels of seed. The paper says that the Minister is in the city. Early on Sunday morning the dead body of an infant was found in the flower garden in front of Dr. E. S. Whittaker's house, in the town of Orange street, by William Clark, the servant girl of Mr. Jackson, charged with swindling the Bank of B. N. A. out of \$3000, by means of a forged letter of credit. It has been committed for trial at the circuit court, which opens in this city next week. J. H. Camberland, merchant, of this city, has been committed for trial for the same offense for forgery.... A jury was secured, after a week or more of effort, to try the Carquet rioters, charged with murder: the trial is now on.... Dr. Steeves, *Globe* says people should be careful not to examine all money received by them, as some very cleverly executed counterfeit Canadian fifty cent pieces are in circulation. One of them was passed at one of the city hotels on Wednesday. It was made of paper, and was in weight and appearance so like a genuine coin, as to almost defy detection. The fraud could only be discovered by rigging the test on a table.... The Halifax School Board has twelve members. The following is the list: The Board is composed of 1 Universalist, 1 Episcopalian, 3 Methodists, 4 Presbyterians, and 5 Roman Catholics. The compensation of the Board is \$1,000—\$300 to the Chairman, and the balance among the members, according to their attendance at Board and committee meetings.... The Lobster Factory at Pugwash, N. S., has closed for the season. The result of their work for the past summer is one hundred and fifty thousand cases (155,000), and at all nineteen thousand three hundred and seventy-five (19,375), being an increase of fifty-six thousand cases (56,000) over last year.... From the *Pictou Standard* we learn that two skeletons have been found in the lower works of the old slope of the Drummond Colliery, by men engaged in the work of repairing and draining.... A new bark, 1,000 tons register, called the *Scott's Bay*, was launched on Saturday from the yard of Mr. Jonathan B. Steele, Scott's Bay, King County, N. S. She is owned by Messrs. Sheffield & Wickwire, Canning; E. Churchill & Sons, Hantsport, and J. M. Commander, Capt. Gen. Murray, late of the bark *J. L. Wickwire*. The *S. B.* was launched ready for sea, with 300 tons of ballast, and left immediately, with a party on board, for Kingsport, to take in stores, prior to proceeding to Sandy Hook for orders.... The *Pictou Standard* has the following: "The schooner *Pumpkin*, built clear from this port with a cargo of coal for Yarmouth, September 30th. We note her reported in Halifax Oct. 8th, whence she proceeded on her voyage to Yarmouth, where she had not arrived on the 29th ult., being then 29 days from Pictou and 21 from Halifax. The *Pumpkin* is a St. John schooner of 120 tons, and was commanded by Captain Brascome.... A man named Harry Garrett, a railway employee, was, it is learned, fatally injured by being jammed between two cars at the Halifax depot, on Wednesday last.... On Tuesday morning last, about half-past two o'clock, the dam at Messrs. Hobart & Payzant's Mill, at the Forks gave way. A large aperture was created in the middle of the dam. It is supposed that the dam was undermined by the action of the water, and that the damage is estimated at \$1,000.... *Windsor Mill*.... The *Yarmouth Herald* states that a barn belonging to W. H. Moody, Esq., situated in the lower section of that town, and containing five or six tons of hay, was, with its contents, totally destroyed by fire between 12 and 1 o'clock on Sunday morning last. The fire was undoubtedly the work of an incendiary. The property was uninsured.... Messrs. Windsor & Payzant's Bark Extrava Factory, Waverley, has been burned. The origin of the fire is unknown. It had not been running for a week, so there had been no fire in it for that period. There was no insurance, and the loss of the enterprising owners is put at \$8,000. In addition to the mill, two hundred and fifty cords of bark were burned....
