E have already drawn attention to the annual meeting of the Society of Arts, held on the 23rd current, under the presidentship of M. Th. de Saussure, and are now able to furnish some further details. Professor Soret, in delivering a most interesting report, passed in review the operations of the Industrial section, n reference to Commerce, laying great stress upon the competition that has taken place in the manufacture of chronometers. This competition was instituted with the object of testing the workmanship and precision of chronometers turned out by Genevese manufacturers, and none but those adopted for pocket use were admitted. They were deposited in charge of the authorities at the Observa tory, and underwent the most searching ordeal possible to be applied to pocket instruments of this class. The jury specially retained to decide the difficult question as t whom to award the palm of excellence unanimously decided in favor of Messrs. J. M. Badollet & Co. This first having carried off the sole prize by exhibiting a chro-nometer which fulfilled in the highest degree every con-dition required, crowned their first success by gaining onorable mention for two other chronometers.
