

The native young men belonging to a theological class in Ceylon, during a late vacation from study, found their recreation in evangelical labors. They visited 745 houses, and saw about 1,800 adults and 800 children. They found some cases of special interest, and met very few cases of opposition.

During the late war in France the Bishop of Verdun disappeared, and it was thought he was dead, the Pope joining in the masses said for his soul. Now he reappears, showing an imposition upon the people, and the Bishop's infidelity. Yet how many American Catholics will persist in holding to the absurd dogma.

The Dominicans have in Japan a numerous mission, of over fifty priests; but they are not popular either with the people or government. They have also a mission in the centre of the capital, which they owe to the power of France. Their work at present seems to be chiefly among their old converts. They have a school of about fifty pupils preparing for the priesthood.

Seventy miles north of Sholapur, a station of the American Board, a formerly notorious thief named Menka, was imprisoned, and his conscience troubling him on getting his liberty, he visited the religious shrines in that region seeking peace. At last a native preacher told him of the Saviour, and the troubled thief believed, with his household, and began to preach to his neighbors. When Rev. Mr. Park visited the village, Menka and four others were baptized.
