Mr. H. C. Murray shipped to P. E. Island from Buctouche, last week, six hundred and ten boxes of preserved lobsters, valued at \$4000. Henry O'Leary Esq., will ship from Richibucto to Liverpool, this week, per barque *Jane Wright*, seven hundred boxes of lobsters, valued at \$4000... John McDermott was examined before Stipendiary Magistrate Blaize, at Richibucto, on Monday, and committed to stand trial at the next Kent Circuit Court, on a charge of attempting to commit a rape on a girl named Morris. McDermott was admitted to bail in the sum of \$1200 for his appearance at the Court... Capt. Brown, of Kincardine Colony fame, has purchased a farm near Woodstock, and proposes to settle there. He intends visiting Grand Falls shortly with the view of locating a colony of Swedes, we believe, somewhere between the Falls and Tobeique river. He cannot select a better place... The *Globe* says the army worm which created so much alarm in this Province last year, although it did comparatively little harm, has again shown itself. Yesterday morning Mr. James F. Ellis, of Fairville discovered a nest of its grounds just commencing to string out on their destructive march. They were all destroyed. It is remarkable that it was on Mr. Ellis' grounds, and in very nearly the same spot where the present lot was discovered that the worm was first discovered last year... Thomas O'Neill was executed on Thursday morning, in the yard of the jail in this city, for the murder of his mother-in-law, Bridget Petherill, in Carleton.

Nova Scotia.—Hon. J. C. Troop, late speaker of the Nova Scotia House of Assembly and a representative of Annapolis County, is dead... An unknown disease is destroying fruit trees in Nova Scotia... A woman who arrived at Picton by train, on the 26th, from Halifax where she had tried to get work and failed, and gives her name as Mrs. Norman Morrison, and her maiden name as Sarah Price, of Perth, Ontario, aged 27, attempted suicide by jumping over the railway pier at Picton landing. She was rescued by men on the pier and taken to a house where her clothing was dried and refreshments offered her. As soon as let loose she repeated the rash act, but was rescued a second time, and conveyed to the police station at Picton. Her husband, who gave her reproaches for having brought her here, is a Nova Scotian. He married her at Port Huron, Michigan, about two years ago.

... On Thursday last, says the *Amherst Gazette*, Mrs. Owen Wood, of Downing's Cove, in this county, saw her child on a raft which was being blown from the shore, ran to its rescue, and was herself drowned, while the child was saved by the father who was at work a short distance away.

The child had made his little raft and put to sea, and in order to rescue him his father had to construct another, so hurriedly that he had not even had time to eat. Another touching story of parental affection... As the coal business continues dull with small prospect of improvement, a number of coal miners from Westville have formed themselves into a gold mining company and leased the Jackson property at Fifteen Mile Stream for two years on tribute. The company, with two or three months supply of provisions, etc., left Westville on Monday for the diggings. They expect to take about ten days in getting their provisions, etc., to the place and the mine prepared.

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The Society of Constantiopolis have declared against the new Sultan as not being vigorous enough.

The *Gazette*'s special from Bristol says the Flying Dutchman last train, running full speed between Farnham and Bristol, left the track near London. The engine and firemen were killed.

Nova Scotia Government have accepted the tender of Messrs. H. Abbott & Co., of Montreal, to construct the railway from New Glasgow to the Strait of Canso for \$7,949 per mile. The contractors are required to supply a steam ferry across the Strait, as provided by the act. Three tenders were sent in, one by Messrs. Shantz & Plunkett, one by Mr. D. Archibald, of Ottawa, and the one that has been accepted. It seems that Shantz & Plunkett's tender was the lowest, but on account of conditions which could not be acceded to, the contract was given to Messrs. H. Abbott & Co.

This is one very important step in the way of facilitating communication between Cape Breton and other parts of the Dominion. It is reported that this first is backed by Sir Hugh Allan...

The *Portland*, Me., *Press*, of the 27th, says a very sharp confidence game was played in this city yesterday. A Mr. Lewis was on his way from Nelson to Amherst, N. S., and yesterday morning took the steamer in Boston to reach the latter place. Soon after going on board he met a finely dressed man who took great pains to give him information. On arriving here last night they went to the Falmouth Hotel, and going into the reading room sat and talked some time. Their conversation was interrupted by a friend of the man who asked him to pay a bill. Of course the latter did not have the money, and produced a check which he tried to get cashed. He was failed in this also, and asked Lewis to let him have \$50 or \$60 until he could get the check cashed. Lewis produced \$60, which was every dollar he had, and let him have it. Then the man asked to be excused a moment and disappeared. Mr. Lewis reported the loss to Deputy Chase, but the thief could not be found.

GENERAL.—Two hundred tons of ice are manufactured daily in New Orleans by the aqua ammonia process... Paris ate 2,370 horses in the first quarter of 1876; 549 more than in the corresponding months of 1875... The new wool clip of Vermont is being bought by manufacturers for twenty-five cents a pound, the lowest price since the war... One hundred and twenty thousand buffalo were slaughtered on the North-west plains during the past year... Property in Toronto is decreasing in value... A mother of four children in New Orleans has been convicted of regularly sending them out to steal. By practice they became very expert, and the profit of their thieving enabled the woman to buy a house and live comfortably. She devoted herself to the sale of the stolen articles and the general direction of the children.

BOSTON, July 27.—Twenty convicts escaped from the State Prison yesterday afternoon, by pure audacity. Two were recaptured, but one, Richard Rossiter, still at large.

The boyish and sturdy mill in Philadelphia three persons lost their lives.

The police of Boston seized liquors in fifty unlicensed bar-rooms to-day.

BOSTON, July 29.—Evidence given by ex-Solicitor General before the House Committee on the Louis Whipple Committee, yesterday, is published, and reflects upon the President's course in shielding the guilty.

A despatch from Gen. Sheridan states that the main body of the Indians are in front of Gen. Crook's camp, and the Indians are being pushed forward with all possible speed.

BOWDISHON, July 29.—A stalwart report which was brought by an Indian courier to Fort Leavenworth, that Crook's command had been routed by the Sioux, is denied at Cheyenne.

The *Times* of New York says that the Sioux are still at large, and are now concentrating at Red Cloud, and a fresh engagement is imminent.
