**NEW BRUNSWICK.**—It is said that diphtheria, of the worst form, prevails in Portland at present. A special despatch to the *Globe* says that quite a large fire occurred on Thursday at Northampton, opposite Woodstock. The fire broke out in the barn of the Northampton House. The Northampton House was totally destroyed; also the new school house, Geo. Alexander's dwelling house, Lewis Coomb's dwelling house, W. F. Smith's dwelling house and store, Roulston's dwelling and a number of outbuildings were burned.... At the port of Chatham during the year ending June 30th, 1875, 168 vessels of 78,077 tons entered. During the year ending June 30th, 1876, 215 vessels of 102,052 tons.... a number of the citizens of Fredericton have presented Mr. Denton Mitchell, of that place, with a handsome gold watch, a stem winder, in recognition of his bravery in rescuing Mr. Owen Smith from drowning a few days ago.... An indecent assault of a violent nature and with criminal intent was committed on a daughter of Mr. Richard English's near Kingston, Kent Co., on Friday evening last by a Frenchman named Cook Perry, who has since been arrested and lodged in the Richibucto goal. This is the second or third attempt of the kind made by Perry.... Among the applicants for the Railways Cashiership at Moncton, the *Watchman* hears of Messrs. James McAllister, Moncton; Alex. McNaughton, paymaster of construction trains; John McKenzie, R. R. Boyer, D. B. Lindsay, and others.... The St. Croix Courier says that the delay in erecting new station houses at McAdam Junction has been occasioned by a discussion among those interested as to the proper site. It has been finally decided to place them on the ground where the old buildings stood, and the work of erection will be commenced immediately.... A search for Mr. Brush, the missing Railway cashier, is being vigorously pushed by the Government. It is said that Mrs. Brush received the sum of \$300 from her husband, by mail, soon after left Moncton, probably from St. John. That amount Mrs. Brush at once handed over to the Government, and she has resumed work at her original occupation, that of telegraph operator.... It is understood that Mr. Daniel McLaughlin, of Indiantown, Miramichi, is negotiating with Hon. Mr. Mitchell for the purchase of Bearcamp Island, and that should the purchase be made Mr. McLaughlin will erect a steam saw mill thereon.... Rouse was brought before the Police Magistrate at Sussex, Saturday, and fully committed for trial.... On Sunday afternoon a quantity of what is known as red fire ignited by some means unknown in the drug store of Mr. George Stewart, King street, and did some damage before the fire was extinguished.... Mr. Charles Brennan, keeper of the York County jail, was suddenly stricken with paralysis Monday morning, about nine o'clock, while in the act of leaving the jail to attend to his duties as cleric of the court now in session.... Jahn Leppich, an Australian sailor on the English bark *Meggy*, discharging ballast at Chatham, Miramichi, was killed on Wednesday last almost instantly, by being struck on the head by the falling of the hoisting gear.... Recently, Robert Smith, an Englishman, was drowned by falling off the wharf at Kerr's mill, Rosebank, while carrying deals.

**NOVA SCOTIA.**—A despatch to the *Telegraph* from North Sydney, C. B., July 21, says:—A number of coal cutters withdrew this week, from the strike at the old Sydney mines and resumed work yesterday. The windows of their houses were broken with stones thrown by the miners continuing on the strike.... One thousand dozen gall eggs arrived in a schooner at Halifax, on Thursday, from the Bird Rocks, Gulf of St. Lawrence.... The Yarmouth Herald says:—Capt. Charles McDormand, of the Schooner "Lily Dale," of Westport, arrived at this port on Saturday last. Capt. McD. reports that he fell in with an immense school of porpoises and herrings about six miles north of Yarmouth Light. He estimated its extent to be at least three acres.... The porpoises seemed to be following the herring very closely, and so excited were the latter that they had to raise his hand to his wife Tuesday night in a fit of jealousy; his mother in law interfering, was shot and will probably die.... At Pittsville, Pa., on Monday, a little son of John E. Cameron lowered his younger sister into a burning lime-kiln for a ride, but was unable to pull the bucket up, and both he and his mother were burned alive in a futile endeavor to save the girl.... The total amount of colting at the San Francisco mint for the year ending June 30th was \$5,989,500, of which \$27,033,000 was in gold coin. This is the largest amount ever coined at this mint in any year, and is the largest annual coinage of any mint in the United States if not in the world.... Grasshoppers are devastating portions of Minnesota. But no complaint has yet been made of their presence this season in Manitoba.... Peter Pollicca, a farmer near Franklin Centre, P. Q., was at two o'clock on Friday afternoon engaged unhitching his horses from a mowing machine when lightning struck the mowing machine, instantly killing Mr. Pollicca and both of his horses, and stunning a boy who was present, and who remained unconscious for nearly two hours.... A fishing schooner at Cape Elizabeth, Me., took in her seine at one hour, the other day, 900 barrels of mackerel. She could only hold 300, and had to give the other 600 away.

LONDON, July 20.—Lord Derby had received a note from Mr. Webster, asking him to forbear, and the postponement of the resumption of the discussion on the oxidation correspondence, as the discussion would impair pending negotiations Earl Granville yielded.

J. G. HARRIS, Australian merchant, who made an arrangement with their creditors last year, to whom he was in a field adjoining the Halifax City Prison, escaped on Friday afternoon.... Two North Sydney boys, aged 13 and 18 years respectively, procured pistols and played highwaymen on the road. They demanded "the money or the life" of a passer-by. He declined to carry out the play, whereupon the youngest of the boys fired and lodged a small dose of shot in the traveler's face.

The Telegraph says that the Duke of Marlborough will succeed the Duke of Abercorn, as Lord Lieutenant of Ireland. The Mail furnishes the following items: Jacob Rufus left Plymouth fifteen years ago and was supposed to have been killed in

the American war. His estate was administered on and divided among his heirs. And now Mr. Rufus, who was down South in Dixie, but not killed, has turned up to claim his property.... A soldier of the 60th Rifles, at Halifax, who discharged his rifle at a comrade, was tried at Court Martial and sentenced to 2 years' imprisonment.... A little girl named Baker, living with her parents in Albemarle street, Halifax, was choked to death on Sunday last by a piece of beef which stuck in her throat.... The North Sydney Herald says that during the past week a number of fishing vessels have arrived in port from Newfoundland. The fishermen, owing to the complete failure of the fisheries around the shores of Newfoundland, are about trying their luck on our shores. They report the Newfoundland fisheries a total failure.... The Nova Scotia cherry crop will be light this year. At some places the trees have borne no fruit at all.... The Hon. Edward Murray Dodd, a retired Judge of the Court of Nova Scotia, died on Monday at Cow Bay, Cape Breton. Judge Dodd had been a long time on the bench of Nova Scotia, and was advanced in years. He was highly respected both as a judge and as a private citizen.

AN ORIENTAL traveller describes this busy scene, witnessed on historic shores: "Our steamer landed on a beach which was the port of Antioch where the disciples were first called Christians. There was no town at the water's edge, no people, no wharf. The passengers and the merchandise were put ashore in lighters, which ran up into the sand. A troop of camels, with their drivers, lay on the beach, ready to transport the goods into the interior. Among the articles landed were boxes marked 'DR. J. C. AYER & CO., LOWELL, MASS., U. S. A.' showing that they contained medicines and whence they came. These with other goods were hoisted on the backs of camels, for transportation to Antioch. Thus the skill of the West sends back its remedies to heal the maladies and quarrels arising among the officers. Cairo, Egypt, has suffered by a great fire near the regulars."

The Full Mail Gazette says: "We are still of opinion that the scandal of Winslow's liberation might have been avoided, or the responsibility attaching to England considerably lightened, had a different attitude been assumed at an earlier stage of the proceedings."
