But when the owner of the goods objects to executing such bonds, or is unable without inconvenient delay to obtain satisfactory sureties as herein required, delay to obtain satisfactory sureties as herein required, his own bond may be taken, provided the Bill of Lading under which the goods are forwarded is made in the form furnished by the Department of Inland Revenue and conditioned for the delivery of the goods only upon the order of the Collector of Inland Revenue or other proper officer of the Inland Revenue Division in which the goods are to be re-warehoused.
