ON Sunday evening the 19th inst., Prof. Geo. G. Foster delivered an address on temperance in the Free Baptist church, Woodstock.

HE regretted the circumstances rendering the calling together of the Legislature; expressed sympathy with the sufferers by the disastrous fire; referred gratefully to the people everywhere, who rendered generous assistance to the sufferers, and rendered "thanks to Him who has made of one flesh all nations of the earth, that He has put it into the hearts of His people to succour those who are in want."

HE also expressed regret at the calamities that had befallen St. Stephen and Woodstock during the summer. The principal object of the session he stated thus:—

"The Corporation of the City of Saint John having determined upon seeking further powers to deal with the present emergency, bills will be laid before you to amend the law for the better protection of the Corporation in the City of Saint John; to regulate the construction of buildings, and to provide for the better regulation of the streets within the limits of the city and the Town of Portland."

HE expressed great faith in the future of the afflicted city, the enterprise of the people being shown in the progress already made in rebuilding; and is "convinced that at no distant day the city will be built of less destructive material, presenting a more imposing appearance, its trade and commerce in a way unimpeded, and its people comforted by their misfortunes, and strengthened by the exhibition of Christian charity which these misfortunes have called forth.

PRELIMINARY. Mr. Beveridge introduced a bill to authorize the municipality of Victoria, to assess the County in aid of the sufferers by the Saint John fire.

Messrs. Fraser and Barker introduced similar bills for Fredericton and York Counties respectively; Mr. Marshall a bill to authorize the City Corporation of St. John to issue debentures to replace others destroyed by fire, also petitions of the Common Council in favor of the bill for widening Dock and Mill and Smyth streets, and extending Canterbury street; and the petition of W. Scovill, Jas. Lawton, G. J. Chubb and one hundred and forty others against widening Dock street. Both of the above petitions were, on motion of Mr. Marshall, read from the Clerk's table.

AT 11 o'clock, Mr. Mackay moved the address in reply to the speech. He touched upon the extent of the St. John fire calamity and the aid and sympathy it called forth everywhere; referred to the necessities of the city growing out of the calamity, and called for a special session of the Legislature, also to the calamities in St. Stephen and Woodstock, the aid extended by cities, towns and individuals everywhere; also approved of the postponement of the exhibition under the circumstances, and closed by expressing the hope that the session would be characterized by the quick transaction of the necessary business.

MR. FLEWELLING seconded in the customary manner.

THE Address passed to section three, when Mr. S. J. S. moved to amend the part of himself and others in the petition for the rebuilding and replacing of public property destroyed by the recent fire in St. John, in which the House might mark the passage of this paragraph with unusual emphasis. The charity evoked by the great calamity and which had overwhelmed the citizens of St. John with unspendable gratitude was as magnificent as it was spontaneous. At best he would ask the House to pass the paragraph by a standing vote.

ALL the members then recorded their votes by standing in their places.
