THE attention of all persons concerned in the Fisheries and in that part of the Bay of Fundy around the entrance to the same, is called to certain provisions of the Dominion Fisheries Act and Fishery Regulations and of the Statute 36 Vic., c. 65, relating to navigable streams an rivers; which statutes prohibit capturing salmon by drift nets;—catching salmon and bass during the close seasons;—destroying the fry of all kinds of fish;—catching fish in nets or other fishing apparatus between Saturday nights and Monday mornings;—and putting mill rubbish or other deleterious substances into the water injurious to the fisheries.

The Fishery Officers are required to enforce these pronets;—catching salmon and bass during the close seasons hibitions with renewed yigilance and activity.

The penalties provided for infringing these laws consist of fines and forfeitures of the fishing materials illegally used and the fish unlawfully caught or possessed, bough
