THE MICROPHONE.

A paper lately read before the Royal Society an-

nounces the invention, by Prof. Hughes, of this

astonishing instrument or apparatus, which opens to our ears a universe of sounds hitherto inaudible -just as the microscope revealed a world of minute life and structure unknown before. Like Mr. Edison, Prof. Hughes was one day employing the telephone for acoustic experiments. He wished to investigate the effect of sonorous vibrations upon the electrical behaviour of conductors, led to this idea by the way in which selenium is known to become electrically affected by light, and also by the researches of Sir William Thompson upon the electrical conduct of strained wires. The Professor had a stretched wire on his telephonic circuit, and, though he talked and plucked at it, no effect followed until it broke. At that moment the tele- sort of play.
