CLAIRVOYANT DOCTORS. It has often surprised us that sensible Christian people were so ready to believe in the power of a clairvoyant doctor to see the nature of their disease and read their very thoughts, without any proper evidence on which to base this belief. In many cases it seems as if popular credulity was hungry for some pretender's wonders; like children to whom some marvellous fairy tales were more acceptable than the prosaic facts of ordinary life. This credulity is far more widespread than, from the spread of knowledge, one would think. Mr. Baird, a recent writer in Scribner, believes that nine tenths of what are called intelligent people believe more or less firmly that certain persons in I find homes at peculiar states of mind, or body, have the power of clairvoyance, or clear seeing, or as it is sometimes called of second sight. And yet the whole accumu lations of medical knowledge, of attested facts of human experience, and of common sonso go to es-

> delusion, utterly unsupported by proper proof. The N. Y. Tribune thinks Mr. Baird rather exaggerates the prevalence of belief in clairvoyance: but in reply he shows that there is a great variety of names and forms of this superstition, and a good deal of passive admission or acquiescence, which does not find a positive expression. The success which the professors of this art appear to have gained may be traced to systematic guess-work, coincidences, and trickery. It is not very difficult for a shrewd person to draw out of the average patients the main symptoms of their disease, and the surprise and delight of the credulous dupe. Indeed, as Mr. Baird says, it is not only easy to get information from most people about themselves; you can hardly prevent them telling you, directly or indirectly, about themselves. The trial of Joseph Meagher for the murder of Wm. Connick took place at Newcastle before the Northumberland Circuit Court, Judge Wetmore presiding, on Friday and Saturday last. Attorney General Fraser appeared for the Crown, and Messrs. Adams and Wilkinson for the defence. The affair occured at Nelson, in Northumberland county, on the 25th of March last. Joseph Meagher (the prisoner), his brother James, Connick, the murdered man, and others, were drinking in Carroll's tavern. After going outside Connick was stabbed, receiving injuries from which he died two days afterwards, and it was alleged that the stabbing was done by Joseph Meagher. James Meagher left the country. The jury retired between five and six o'clock on Saturday evening and were absent about four hours, and on their return rendered a verdict of "manslaughter." Meaghre was sentenced to seven years in the St. John penitentiary, with hard




