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#### AN IMMENSE TREASURE.

One of the richest storehouse of rarities in the world is the famous treasury of the Sultan of Morocco in Fez. It was founded in the year 815 by Edris Ben Edris, who was also the founder of the city. During the middle ages Fez, then the captial of the kingdom of Morocco, was one of the most populous Mohammedan cities in the world, and though it declined after the removal of the Sultans to Morocco, it is still a place of great importance, containing 100 mosques, and ranking with the Western Arabs as their specially Holy city. Almost every Sultan has added to the treasures of the Royal Museum, which contains magnificent spoils | Per cent. Dominion bonds, \$13,000; total \$56,000. from the various Christian armies and territories which have been vanquished or ramsacked by the Mohammedan conquerors. A great mass of the enormous treasure accumulated by the Moors during their dominion in Spain was transported to Fez and is preserved in the Royal Museum. The sword of Ferdinand the Catholic, set with precious jewels, is said to be included among the rarities. The treasure-chamber has always been gnarded with jealous care and travellers who have been admitted to a sight of it assert there are no less than 2,000 locks. A Tunis Journal reports that Sultan Sidi Muley Hassan, who is a great sufferer from the gont, a few months ago intrusted the 2,000 keys to the keeping of one of his brothers, Prince Muley Abbas, who in his turn, not relishing the charge made it over to the Governor of Fez. Last month the Sultan received from one of his vassals a hand some revolver, set with gold and precious stonesas a present, and the valuable gift was immediatetransferred to the great treasure chamber. When the place was opened and the inventory revised it was discovered that some of the chests and closets had been broken open and completely emptied of their precious contents. The arrests which immediately beceme the rule in the palace led to no satisfactory result, and the Sultan of Morocco is now offering the sum of £8,000 for the discovery of the thief or thieves. -London Echo.




