NEWBRUNSWICK.—It is expected that the new Post Office building will ready for occupancy soon after the first of January.... The Capital says it is worthy of note, as indicative of the steady revival of business, both the passenger and freight business of the N. B. railway is this year largely in excess of what it was last year.... Jadas Gogain, of Coague, and Michael W. Coulin, of Newcastle left this week for England, with a diamond which they expect to sell for some fabulous sum.

It was found among the stones at the ballast wharf, Newcastle. Gogain also takes about a hundred pearls gathered on the North shore from oysters and clams.... It is understood the Maritime Bank has begun an action against Mr. James Donville to recover \$400,000. A child was born in Edmonton, Madawaska, the other day, which had two bodies, two heads joined together, and only one eye in the centre of its forehead. It lived some time after birth.... A very malignant type of diploria prevails to some extent at Centreville.... Eight car loads of English machinery for Messrs. Park's cotton mill have been received at St. John Station recently.... The News says Mr. James Clark, of Fredericton, R. R., is the largest vegetable dealer in the Province. He reports that he has raised this year 500 bushels of squash, mainly of the Hubbard, Marrow and Turban varieties, and over 30 tons of tomatoes. These latter were mostly of the Gen. Grant variety, noted for special fitness of flavor. The season as a whole has been very favorable for gardening, though the recent rains followed as they were by cold weather, have somewhat retarded the complete ripening of market vegetables.... While Robert Morrison, Esq., J. P., and his son-in-law, Mr. Charles J. Upham, manager of the Sussex Tannery, are now shooting in the woods, Mr. Upham fired at some partridges, the shot entering the squirrel's leg. Mr. Morrison was hid from view at the time.... The Sun says Mr. James Humphreys, of Hammond River, had a valuable fifteen-months-old colt shot and killed by an unknown assassin a few days ago. Mr. H. intended to exhibit the animal at the exhibition next month, as it was remarkable for size and beauty, and he therefore feels his loss keenly. All efforts to disclose the identity of the cowardly villain have as yet

proved futile.... During the fire which raged in the forests of Grand Manan prior to the recent heavy rains, says a Bangor paper, a constant watch was kept night and day by the inhabitants whose dwellings were in danger and their escape from destruction was solely owing to the light wind which prevailed during the eight or ten days of the fire, as a strong northwest or west wind would have swept many of the settlements. When the wind changed it fortunately came from the northeast, which drove the fire back over the burnt district and towards the water, sweeping over the high cliff to the water in some instances. It is a severe loss to the island, though considerable of the standing timber will be saved next winter to cut. The fire originated by two boys burning out a hornet's nest.... Mrs. Traynor, of Lake George, Prince William, York Co. 103 years old, left the residence of her daughter, Mrs. Cleary, Tuesday morning the 14th inst., with a pall and pitcher to get a fall of water from the spring a short distance from the house, but did not return. Her daughter was not much alarmed, and supposed her mother had gone to a neighboring house. It rained on part of Tuesdays, Wednesday and a part of Thursday, and search was not instituted until Saturday afternoon, when a large party of men were detailed to search for her. Her body was found on Sunday afternoon about three o'clock along the shore of Lake George, about one mile and a half from her daughter's house. From viewing the body, its position, the pale close by with the pitcher etc., it appeared she had died from exposure to the storm. An inquest was held by Coroner E. D. Estabrooks, and the jury returned a verdict of "Died from exposure and neglect".... While attempting to cross the Nashwaak river, en route for the recent Methodist bazaar, Upper Nashwaak, a young man named Biley, belonging to St. Mary's having in company with him a Miss Abernathy, ventured into deep water with the vehicle and drowned the horse. The young lad came very near sharing the same fate.
