Sir Leonard moved the House into committee on the increase of Dominion notes to \$20,000,000. He stated the law as it stood and showed the necessity of changing the law, under which the Government could issue an unlimited amount of notes, provided that they held dollar for dollar in gold after the issue exceeded \$12,000,000. He proposed to limit the Government to an issue of twenty millions and to reduce the amount of gold required to be held. The practical operation of the resolutions would be to relieve \$2,290,000 of gold now held and replace that sum with guaranteed securities. Dominion notes are to be redeemable at Charlottetown, Winnipeg and Victoria, in addition to the cities where already they may be redeemed. The present circulation of Dominion notes is \$12,400,000, and under the present law the Government has to hold \$400,000, in gold against the circulation to that amount, because it is required that all circulation of notes over twelve million shall have gold to the same amount, thus depriving the country of the profit on the circulation. Existing law requires in the present circumstance no less than \$3,800,000 as a gold reserve. Under the proposed law the gold reserve would be \$1,875,000 and the guaranteed reserve \$1,250,000; thus the release of gold under the present circumstances would be about \$2,000,-000. If the circulation should be increased to \$16, 000,000 the reserve in gold will be \$2,400,000, and guaranteed debentures \$1,600,000 -- total \$4,000,000. Should the circulation be increased to but \$15,000,-000, the result would be—gold reserve \$2,250,000; guaranteed debentures \$2,500,000; total \$3,750, 000. This would release \$1,550,000 of the present gold deposits and give two and a half millions of

additional circulation. Cartwrlght said the Government had changed their views. Also, that the step will still further diminish the gold reserve held in this country, which is small.
