ORNAMENTING THE SCHOOL-HOUSE. -The schoolhouse should be the centre of attraction in every country district. It should be a model in its inner arrangements and outward embellishments. We have now to deal particularly with the latter, because these come within the realm of horticulture. In the same way that a museum of specimens is collected for instruction within doors, there should be a collection of trees and plants about the house. Pupils should be made familiar with the growth of plants, shrubs and trees, by immediate and constant contact with them at school, and they will become especially interested in any that are placed under their care and protection. The idea that the school grounds are simply a romping-place is erroneous. There is nearly as much to be learned in the yard as in the house, from May until October, and the material brought into the yard should be protected as carefully as maps, harts, globes, etc., indoors.


