It is intended to locate the bridge the Reichstag in person. Prince Bismarck read to near the railway bridge and close to it. The piers of the new structure will correspond with those of the railway bridge, and while they will strengthen the railway bridge piers the latter will protect the passenger bridge piers from the crush of ice and logs. In this way the structures will naturally strengthen each other. The new bridge will be of the Arch Burr truss design, with chords of Southern pine. There will be five spans, 150 feet each, and a span in the middle of fifty-three feet; this latter in the railway bridge being originally intended for a draw. The piers will be built of hewn cedar built so that the outer surface will be smooth, the inside filled with stone. The length of the roadway from shore to shore will be 1,003 feet. The piers will be forty feet high from the bottom to the river.


