EAST SAGINAW, Sept. 6.—Farm houses, barns and crops have been burned at Saginaw and Toluca Counties to the extent of over \$100,000. Railway travel is stopped. The fire is still burning in Saginaw Valley.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 6.—Later despatches from the Indians treacherously fired on the troops, and the Indians were driven off after a severe fight. Our loss was: Capt. Herbig and four privates killed; sergeant and three privates wounded. After burying the dead, the Indians retreated as rapidly as practicable, arriving on the 31st. Some of the Indians had preceded and had killed eight men on the road to Thomas. Next morning they made a demonstration against the troops, but in the afternoon, they were repulsed.

LANSING, Mich., Sept. 7.—A fire this afternoon destroyed the central portion of the town, including 15 dwellings. Loss \$100,000.
