THE BOMBARDMENT TO BEGIN THIS A. M.

ALEXANDRIA, July 10.—The English ultimatum was delivered at four this morning, so the bombardment will commence at the same hour to-morrow morning. All the foreign men-of-war except the crews of our British ships are ordered to leave the harbor of Alexandria.

New York, July 9.—The steamer "Asyrian Monarch" which arrived yesterday, reported that on Saturday, while off the banks, a large ship ran into and sank a small schooner. Three half-naked men ran across the deck of the schooner and then sank beneath the waves.
