As the rev. gentleman concluded, he stepped back from Hughes, and almost instantaneously the plank was removed from the inside and the condemned man was lifted from the platform with a jerk, the feet being about two feet from the plat form. Dr. Christie immediately took his place beside the hanging body, and with watch in hand from minute to minute felt the pulse. For five minutes they were beating 72 to the minute; they then gradually grew slower and by the time he had beenhanging eight minutes they had entirely ceased to beat. Death was apparently easy, for there was no struggle, the only motions being a clenching of the hands and three attempts at inhalation. The body of the deceased was removed from the jail within 18 minutes after the drop fell and was carried to the Alms House for interment. By the time the Coroner's enquiry was over, all traces of the callows was removed.


