- The Germ theory of disease is likely to derive additional importance from the report of the German Scientific Commission, sent to Egypt some three months ago to investigate the cholera epidemic. The Commission have, it is said, come to the conclusion that certain minute red-like bodies of the bacillus character are the cause of, if they do not constitute, the disease. Some eighteen months ago Dr. Koch, the Director of Scientific Medical Inquiries at Berlin, announced that a bacillus was the cause of tubercle, and it is he who is now responsible for the statement as to the origin of cholera. This eminent German investigator is now leaving for India to make further researches into the nature of Asiatic cholera, and we trust that he will not only discover the cause, but some effective mode of dealing with this dread scourge.
