



The conveyance to be made by a seaworthy and commodious passenger Steamboat of sufficient power and capacity to perform the round trip in twelve hours, including a reasonable detention at each port of arrival for the exchange of Mails, and to be subject to the approval of the Postmaster General in regard to safety, accommodation for passengers and rate of speed. The Mails to leave St. John daily (Sundays excepted) on accommodation for passengers and rate of speed. The Mails to leave St. John daily (Sundays excepted) on and from the first day of March until the first day of December- at 8 o'clock A. M., and during the months of December, January and February to leave St. John on Monday, Wednesday and Friday of each week, at 8 o'clock A. M.—reaching Digby at 11.45 o'clock A. M., and Annapolis at 1.15 o'clock P. M. Returning: To leave Annapolis on the same days, immediately after arrival of Mail train from Halifax—and not later than 2.30 o'clock P. M.—calling at Digby, and reaching St. John at 8 o'clock P. M. on the same days. And to convey Mails by any additional trips which the Steamer may make between the points named. Mails to be conveyed, each way, between the Steamboat and the several Post Offices on, and at each terminus of the route, at the expense of the Contractor.
