The Rt. Hon. Henry Faucett, Post Master General of Great Britain died on the 6th inst. He was. fifty-one years old. When 25 years of age he lost his sight by a shooting accident. He has, however, been a most hard-working and influential member of parliament for twenty years. From 1880 till his death he was Post Master General, and his administration of the affairs of the Department has been successful. "His work in this office is his greatest monument, and his name will ever be indisolubly connected with the practical extension of cheap postal facilities throughout Great Britain."

It is refreshing to learn that an attempt to introduce this system of advertising into Paris was quickly checked by the authorities and fined \$50 for the offence. The charge against it, which the Court sustained, was that it "annoyed the public vision." We wish we could believe that some time the custom would receive like treatment in this country.
