NEW BRUNSWICK.

Traffic over the N. B. Railway bridge at Woodstock was resumed Monday.

The Nashua's ferry sank at her winter moorings, below Gibson wharf, Tuesday.

The appeal in the case of W. Russell was dismissed, and he was sent to the Penitentiary on Friday last. His sentence is for ten years.

Halibut is coming into the market in considerable quantity and retails at 10 and 12 cents per pound. The catch of gasperus for several days past has been good; the fish retail at 80 cents per hundred.

While Jas. Mealy, jr., was crossing the channel which separates New River Island from the mainland in a sail-boat, on Friday last, a squall struck the boat and capsized it. The boat soon afterwards sank, and young Mealy was drowned. He leaves a widow and one child.

On Tuesday at Fredericton, the license inspectors made a heavy seizure of liquor from James Tennant, Government House. Two trucks were necessary to haul the liquor to Randolph's building, where they were stored. The value of the seizure amounts to nearly \$1,000.

It is reported that the inquiry into the Dorion case at Tracadie, showed that Laurent Dorion received some injuries in a fight with his son, and that a few days afterwards he was taken ill and died. Erysipelas appeared in a cut in his head and hastened his death.—World.

A DYNAMETER CAPTURED. LONDON, April 11.—Several months ago Sir William Harcourt, the Home Secretary, gave notice to the police of the arrival of a dynamite in England. A watch was immediately put on suspected houses in this and other cities, and it was soon discovered that a man named Daly, alias Denman, who answered the description of the dynamite, had been in the city. He was taken into custody and a search was made of his papers. A letter was found in a suburb with a clerk named James Egan. Three days remained until last Wednesday, when he went to Wolverhampton, and thence to Birmingham, where he was taken into custody. He was charged with the possession of dynamite. It is reported that he was a member of the Irish Republican Brotherhood.
