

PARLIAMENT.

On Tuesday Sir Leonard Tilley delivered the Budget speech. The following are the estimates for the year:

Customs had decreased 10 per cent. in value of articles imported; also from increased activity in manufacturing in Canada. He was glad to say, however, that there was a brightening look about the customs. Things are improving. Duties collected in January and February show an increase of over two hundred thousand dollars over the same months last year. He stated the estimated expenditure for the current year at \$32,850,000, leaving a surplus of one hundred and fifty thousand dollars. Referring to expenditure amount received from last year's temporary loans borrowed from banks, he said, the total amount expended was thirty-five millions since 1st March, 1884. It had been expended as follows:

As to the maturing bonds the holders of them had about twenty-five millions. It had been proposed to the government to exchange this for a short loan payable in seven or eight years at such rate as would be favorable. The rapid construction of the C. P. R. and the bright prospects indicated that by 1891 arrangements may be made to get back the loan the C. P. R. had borrowed, and the necessity for a long loan. As to the \$2,500,000 floating loan, it had been suggested to issue treasury bills for the amount without going to the market. Mr. Tilley made no objection to this, but he said the government was not prepared to do so. ENGLISH AND FOREIGN.

KORTI, March 10.—A messenger from Kordofan reports a rising against the authority of the Mahdi's uncle. There is great dissension and famine among the rebels. The Mahdi has gone to Abbas Island, 130 miles above Khartoum.

Mail advices from Kordofan state that the sixth volume of General Gordon's diary containing telegrams exchanged with Sir Evelyn Baring, has been sent to England. This volume gives a detailed account of the events in the Sudan from Nov. 5th to Dec. 24th. The five other volumes of the diary are in the hands of General Gordon, and will be sent to England as soon as the complete draft of the scheme for the settlement of the Sudan question are in possession of General Wodehouse.

Sukin advises that a forward movement is expected on Monday next, to form a camp five miles distant from the post for the entire English force.

A private messenger sent to Khartoum last June by friends of General Gordon, it is learned, reached his destination and safely delivered to General Gordon despatches entrusted to him.

Gen. Wodehouse told the Canadian voyageurs at the time of their departure from Egypt he would need their services again in the autumn. He said they could either remain until then or return home, and said the places of each as decided to remain in the Sudan would be filled by others of their Canadian brethren.

NOVA SCOTIA.

There were 200 cases of diphtheria and 25 deaths at the north end of Halifax within a few months, believed to have been conveyed in milk from cows drinking water contaminated by effluvia from a slaughter house.

Efforts are being made to have telephone lines erected in Nova Scotia between the following places: Halifax to Windsor, 40 miles; Parrsboro to Antigonish, 30 miles; and Economy Point to Great Village, 18 miles.

The N. S. Legislature have thrown out a bill authorizing Halifax to give a subsidy of \$10,000 a year for twenty years to a dry dock if located within the limits of the city of Halifax; or \$5,000 if located elsewhere in Halifax.

The Union woolen mills in Truro, in Cornwall, Blair, M. P., is largely interested in wool. Friday, loss \$20,000, insured for \$12,500. It is supposed the fire originated by matches dropped in the mill.
