### News of the Week.

#### New Brunswick.

It is believed that the Miramichi Steam Navigation Company will be proceeded against for damages by the friends of those who met their death in the Miramichi disaster. A lawyer's letter, claiming damages, has been sent to the company by one of the survivors of the collision.

Advices received from Miramichi indicate that all the hung-up drives will be got out before the river freezes over.

In the Kent County Court the grand jury found a true bill against Cormier and wife, charged with setting fire to the McEwen house, near Buctouche, some two months ago.

At the October sitting of the divorce court, two cases were entered for trial, McClary v. McClary, and McFarlane v. McFarlane, the former from Kings county, and the latter from Westmorland. Both were undefended, and decrees for absolute divorce were granted in each.

John Galloway, a well to do farmer of Nappan, fell into a cellar Tuesday morning, breaking his neck, causing immediate death.

The people of Moncton and the City Council are endeavoring to provide the city with a public square.

Work has ceased for the present on the mining property of the Northern New Brunswick Mining Co. on the Tobique. It has been found necessary to close up owing to the winter.

The Moncton Transcript says the high tide and winds of last week did much damage to the dykes all along the river.

It is announced that the receipts of the exhibition will prove a little in excess of the estimate and that the expenditure will be a little less than the estimate. The grants and guarantees of the city and provincial government, added to the revenue, will easily enable the association to meet all exhibition expenses.

Hugh McQuestion, of Fredericton Junction, brought suit against the C. P. R. to recover the price of a cow killed by a train last week. The railway authorities paid him \$42.50, and he withdrew the action.

It is proposed to erect houses for those widows whose properties were destroyed by the Chatham fire. The relief fund still continues to increase.

Veniot, Sieverwright and Paulin were elected in Gloucester Co. last week.

Adolphus L. Rawlins is under arrest at S. John on a charge of obtaining money under false pretences. He went about collecting money for the relief of the Chatham fire sufferers.

The Albert County Star has suspended publication.

Chatham is moving in the direction of better fire protection. A new fire engine has been purchased, a thousand feet of hose, two hose reels and other appliances.

It is proposed to make an addition to the Victoria Hospital in this city. The trustees are considering ways and means.

#### Nova Scotia.

Halifax is moving to have a big summer carnival next year.

Mr. and Mrs. M. H. Donovan, of Bear River, had a very narrow escape from being killed one day of last week by a D. A. R. train. The engine struck the carriage and nearly demolished it, and it was a miracle how the occupants escaped instant death.

The schooner Bessie Leule, of Barrington, N. S., from Barbados for New Carlisle, put in Port Hawkesbury Wednesday, partially damaged, and with jibboom, jibstay and forward sails all gone.

The statistics of the coal shipments of Nova Scotia for the nine months

ending Sept. 1895 compared with the same period in 1894, show a large falling off.

Mr. Hutchison of Hutchison and Seaton, commission merchants, Halifax, reported to the police Tuesday that one, Johnson, the firm's bookkeeper was missing with collections of \$1800 made during the day. Johnson was arrested on the I. O. R. train. He had \$1000 with him.

Statement of losses sustained in Halifax and Nova Scotia by insurance companies, made up to 10th October, indicates about \$142,000 as against \$112,000 to the same period last year—an increase of nearly 30 per cent.

In Halifax, Wednesday Bessonet, high constable, of Montreal, arrested Jacob Goldberg on behalf of clothing firms of that city for fraud. Bessonet took his prisoner to Montreal.

Wednesday night burglars after securing tools from the Canada Coal and Railway Co.'s repair shops, entered the store of J. H. Seaman & Co., Joggins Mines, forced open the safe and secured \$25. At River Robert Angus McDonald's store was entered the same night, safe forced open and about \$35 secured.

Track laying for the new electric railway in Halifax is to be commenced at once.

Henry Day of Jeddors was fined \$100 for snaring a moose.—It is said that in the same court a person who flogged a horse to death was fined \$5.00.

The Halifax medical college has fifty students in attendance this season, the largest in its history. The Freshmen class numbers 17. There is a larger return of the older students than ever before. Three lady students are enrolled, one in each year except the second.

A syndicate including H. M. Whitney, of Boston, will erect gas and coke works in Halifax. They will also go into manufacturing. Already a contract has been given to the London-derry Iron mines for \$45,000 worth of pipe.

Mr. Abram Nicholas, Digby, was attacked by a bull on his farm and had one of his ribs broken, besides being badly hurt about the head. The bull first attacked a son of Mr. Nicholas and on the father going to the rescue the animal turned on him.

Thos. L. Brownell, at Northport, Cumb. Co. while feeding his cattle Thursday night upset his lantern, setting fire to the hay in the barn. He just had time to save his cattle and horses. The contents, consisting of hay, grain, farming utensils, etc., were all destroyed.

The academy at Pictou, N. S., was burned Friday night. It is supposed to have been struck by lightning. The building cost \$25,000, and was insured for \$12,000.

The general store of Ferguson Brownell, Amherst, valued at \$4,000, was totally destroyed by fire Friday. Insurance \$2,000. It is supposed to be the work of an incendiary. A new stock of goods had been stored the day before.

The Kentville, N. S., Star office was burned Friday.

A fatal accident occurred at Miller's shooting gallery, Yarmouth, Saturday night. A gun was discharged while in the hands of Henry Roy, the slug passed through Irvin Patton's head behind the ear, and he died in a few moments.

At Antigonish, N. S. Saturday night the store of T. J. Bonner was burglarized and \$350 worth of jewelry stolen.

#### Other Provinces.

In Georgian Bay, Lake Huron, Wednesday, during a gale a schooner was wrecked and all on board—seven men—perished.

The total salmon pack of British Columbia was 512,197 cases of 48 one-pound tins, an increase of 17,826 over 1894.

There is a great excitement in Vancouver over the report from South Kootenay, B. C., where it is said by conservative men that twenty-five silver mines have been discovered which will be worth a million each yearly to the owners.

General Freight Agent Kerr of the Chatham Pacific says that the total number of cattle exported from the Northwest this season to England is fifty thousand. This is an increase of

67 per cent. over last year. The increase will continue steadily for years and at a rate that will soon put the cattle trade at the very front of Northwest industries.

#### United States.

Fourteen business blocks in Alta, Iowa, were destroyed by fire, Wednesday. Loss \$70,000, partially insured.

At Madison Minn., a loss of \$150,000 was caused on Tuesday by the destruction of forty buildings by fire, most of them business places.

There are twenty-four creameries in Main that do nothing but manufacture butter the year round.

The six year-old son of Andrew Vandy, of East Liverpool, Ohio, was burned at the stake the other day by five companions and so badly injured that he cannot recover. Some men happened to see the performance and tried to rescue him, but his clothes had taken fire. A Wild West show exhibited there about a month ago, and since that time the boys of the town have been playing Indian.

A collision by which two persons were fatally hurt, three or four seriously injured, and some twenty more or less bruised, occurred at Hyde Park station, Providence division of the New York, New Haven and Hartford railroad, Thursday.

Frank Corey, a Calais merchant, was drowned at Grand Lake, 35 miles above Calais, last week. Mr. Corey had gone thither on a hunting cruise, and was crossing the Lake in a canoe with an Indian guide, when a squall upset the boat. The guide was taken ashore and resuscitated. Mr. Corey leaves a wife and two small children.

#### British and Foreign.

Famine prevails in the Smolensk and Pskov districts of Russia owing to the failure of crops. The Minister of the Interior recently set apart 1,500,000 roubles for the relief of the inhabitants of these districts, but the ragged and hungry peasants are crowding about the railway stations inquiring what has become of the money.

Sir Henry Parkes, ex-Prime Minister of New South Wales, was married at Sydney on Thursday to Miss Lulia Lynch. Sir Henry is 80 years of age.

A cable from Hamilton, Bermuda, says: "We had a touch of a hurricane here Thursday morning and considerable damage was done. Houses were unroofed, verandas blown down, trees uprooted and foliage considerably damaged. Early crops will suffer. Telephone posts and wires are down in every direction and the telegraph service is totally upset."

#### Where the Day is Born.

The maritime powers of the world have agreed to make London the time centre, and the one hundred and eightieth degree of longitude from London (or Greenwich) as the point where the day changes. This meridian, therefore leads the day. Its passage under the one hundred and eightieth, or midnight, celestial meridian, marks the beginning of a new day for the earth; here to-day becomes to-morrow.

It is here, then, that Sunday is born, just to the west of Honolulu. But bear in mind that the day travels westward. Therefore, this new-born day does not visit Honolulu until it has made the circuit of the globe. Honolulu and New Zealand are only about thirty degrees apart in longitude; but they are a whole day apart as regards any particular day, because the point at which the day changes lies between them. Sunday born on the one hundred and eightieth meridian is a long way off from Honolulu. It is morning there, too, but it is Saturday morning; while in New Zealand it is not yet day, but the Sunday dawn is breaking. It is clear, then, that if it is Friday (near midnight) at Honolulu to the east of the line, and Sunday (near 1 A. M.) to the west of it, a ship which sails from Honolulu to New Zealand, or from east to west, must sail out of Friday into Sunday, and thereby skip the intervening Saturday, and gains a day; and, vice versa, a ship which sails from New Zealand, where Sunday has begun, to Honolulu. Friday has just ended and Saturday begun, or west to east, must lose a day.

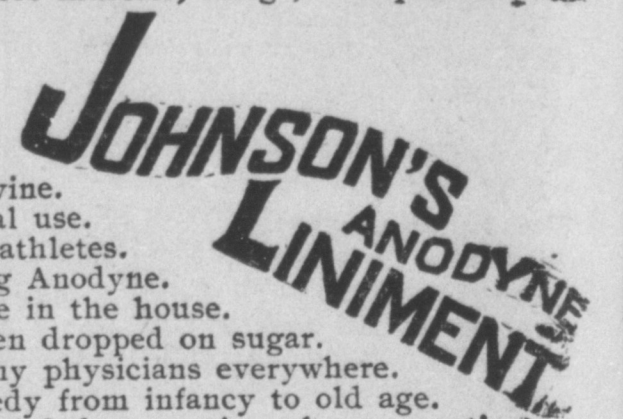
