"The Scott Act," as it says, "was enacted some years ago, sixty counties in Canada have taken advantage of its provisions to prohibit the sale of liquor, and the need of machinery to give expression to the views of the people of small districts on the subject of the lique traff; has been generally recognized, but a recent decision of the courts cast a doubt upon the legality of the penal clauses of the measare, and unless this doubt was removed by amendments to the act, it would become practically inoperative." The object of the amending bill was thus explained by Mr. Foster, M. P., on its intro-

"It is not simply some little trifling amendments to be made to the bill in order to render it more workable than at present, but it is intended to do away with difficulties which stand directly in front of the working of the bill. There happened to be in the legislation of 1883 a clause which, according to the interpretation of the Supreme Court of New Brunswick, entirely takes away the precedure and penalties of the Canada Temperance Act. 
