PLANETARY VELOCITY.—It is difficult to comprehend that in addition to the earth's motion around the sun the latter is also moving through space at the rate of 160,000,000 miles in a year. The astronomers of the last century discovered that our solar system was flying through space in the direction of the constellation Hercules; in other words, if the spectator were to take a stationary point in the heavens, he would see our sun with its attending planets, passing through space at the rate of nearly 450,000 miles per day. Six thousand years ago, it is computed, our solar system was a million millions of miles farther from the stars of Hercules than it is to-day. The region in which we are entering is more thickly studded with stars—that is, with suns of other solar systems—than the heavenly regions we have left behind us. What a marvelous universe we live in! When we travel on a railway car at the rate of fifty miles an hour it makes our head swim; but when we call to mind that the earth revolves on its axis once in twenty-four hours and around the sun, 92,000,000 miles distant, in 365 days, and that the sun is flying through space 160,000,000 miles in a year, human consciousness cannot comprehend the mad whirl of worlds by which we are surrounded.

New York dealers in fireworks say that the money expended for these articles this year amounted to \$3,000,000, and nearly half the sum was for fire-crackers. These are nearly all imported from China and Japan.

The replacement of a diseased eye by the healthy eye of an animal has now been done five times, with one success, says the *Medical Record*. In the four cases, the cornea sloughed; in two, however, firm vascular adhesions took place.—*Science*.

The place of exile fixed upon for Theebaw, the late tyrant of Burmah is Rutnagiri, the sea side station of the Presbyterian Kalapoor Mission! It is a beautiful sea port of some 15,000 to

20,000 native population, well elevated and having a fine outlook upon the ocean; and the Royal exile is to have ample provision for his comfort.

During a fearful storm at Pittsburg, Pa., recently, Mrs. John Erill became frightened, and went to her bedroom to sprinkle herself with "holy water." By mistake she secured a bottle containing sulphuric acid, and dashed its contents over her head and face. It is feared that she will lose her sight, and that her face will be permanently disfigured.

About twenty-five thousand deaths from typhoid fever occur in the United States annually, says the *Medical Record*; and this represents fully one hundred and fifty thousand cases of the disease. Statistics show that there is no disease so easily preventable as this, and it is safe to say that fully one-third of this mortality might be saved by greater cleanliness and more attention to sewerage.

Ladies in Demerara use the large fire fly of that region for ornamentation in wire cages at the ears and in the hair and variously disposed on the dress. Young men also use them in various ways as signals for identification at night. And they are often found, in well-to-do families, in small cages for use as night lamps to retire by, one or two giving sufficient light for that purpose.

We are not surprised that the committee who had charge of the services conducted by Sam Jones, in Chicago, have concluded not to ask him to return in the fall, as they had expected to do. It is said that the reason is that after publicly renouncing the use of tobacco he has gone back to the use of the filthy weed. They think that a man who asks others to make a great resolve ought to be able to keep his own good resolutions.

A statistics fiend is out with some curious facts regarding ancestry. He declares that in the first generation a man reckons only two ancestors, his father and mother. In the second generation the two are changed into four, since a man has two grandfathers and two grandmothers. Each of these four had two parents, and thus in the third generation there are found to be eight ancestors—that is, eight great-grandparents. In the fourth generation the number of ancestors is sixteen, in the fifth thirty-two, in the sixth sixty-four, in the seventh 128, in the eighth 256, in the ninth 512, in the tenth 1,024, in the eleventh 2,048, in the twelfth 4,096, in the thirteenth 8,192, in the fourteenth 16,384, in the fifteenth 32,768, in the sixteenth 65,536, in the seventeenth 131,072, in the eighteenth 262,144, in the nineteenth 524,288, in the twentieth 1,048,576, and in the thirtieth 1,073,741,834.

Concerning the longevity of fish some very remarkable instances are given. Prof. Baird states that there is evidence that carp have attained an age of 200 years, and there is a tradition that within fifty years a pike was living in Russia whose age dated back to the fifteenth century. The Russian Minister says that in the royal aquariums in St. Petersburg there are fish to-day that have been known by the records to have been in their 140 years. An *attache* of the Chinese legation says there are sacred fish kept in some of the palaces in China that are even older than any of those in Russia.
