No one is altogether free from one or the other of the manifold forms in which this scourge attacks the human body, and it would seem that no dietetic rules can be framed which would ensure deliverance from the insidious attacks of this foe, which, however mild, are liable to pass into the more confined or chronic state of the complaint particularly when they occur frequently or are neglected. Every person suffering from Indigestion, Dyspepsia, Stomach out of order, Costiveness, Sick Headache, Loss of Sleep, Wakefulness, Jaundice, Eilious Complaint, Bad Breath, Loss of Appetite, etc., should try
