News of the Week.

NEW BRUNSWICK.

Mr. Aaron Smith has been awarded the contract for snow ploughing in the upper end of the city, and Mr. James Dunlap in the lower end.

The writs have been issued for Queens Co., N. B. Nomination takes place Wednesday, January, 11th, and the election January 18th.

An aged and infirm lady, Mrs. Joseph Blakeney, was burned to death at North River, near Salisbury, a day or two ago. She was alone in the house and her clothing caught fire from sparks.

Col. S. K. Foster, a well known citizen of St John, died last week at his son's residence in Ottawa.

Robt. Currie was fined \$100 or six months jail for assaulting the salvation army captain in Indian-town.

In a few days trains equipped with electric signals and steam heaters, will be running over the Intercolonial Railroad.

Phillip Robinson was found dead in his bed in this city on Tuesday of last week.

A soldier, Fairweather, was fined \$15.00 for disturbing the Salvation army in this city.

Mr. Van Horne has answered the Fredericton city council's letter in reference to the location of the Short Line machine shops. He says the shops must be located at divisional points not less than 100 miles apart. Fredericton, he thinks, would hardly be available, being only 90 miles from Moncton.

Eighteen thousand barrels of calcined plaster from the Albert Manufacturing Company's works at Hillsboro were brought to Moncton in scows this season and about 15,000 barrels transhipped over the Intercolonial to points in the upper provinces. The Albert company also shipped two cargoes by water to Halifax and a large number to the States.

NOVA SCOTIA.

Arthur McGray, of Cape Island, son of the late Captain McGray, ex-M. P. P., has been appointed United States consular agent—the office held by his late father.

The following comparisons of licenses applied for in 1887 and 1888 in Halifax will be of interest: Last year 88 applied; 83 licenses were granted; 69 were taken out. This year 93 applied, including 10 wholesale and three breweries; leaving only 80 applicants for retail licenses (20 hotels and 60 shops), or eight applications less than last year.

The big raft broke loose from the steamer towing it, in the storm of Sunday 18th inst. It is now drifting about on its own book.

A little over \$20,000 worth of gold was recorded at the Mines Office as being taken out of Nova Scotia mines during November.

The Halifax gas company has paid over \$80,000 for the Halifax electric light company's property.

A Windsor correspondent writes the Mail:—All of the industrial institutions of the town are in full blast, some of them working long hours. An idle man is not to be seen on the streets. A new tannery for the manufacture of upper leather is to be started. The old tannery confines its operations, which are extensive and profitable, solely to the manufacture of sole leather. With these two tanneries at hand, a shoe factory might be made pay. Work on the new iron bridge over the Avon is going along more rapidly than during the summer months. There are large gangs of men at work.

Frank McNeally, the Saco, Me., bank embezzler, was arrested in Halifax Friday morning at the Halifax Hotel.

Friday morning a terrible explosion of dynamite occurred at McDonald's lime quarry, four miles south of Brookfield, which resulted in the death of four men and the wounding two more persons. Contrary to the usual mode, Mr. McDonald placed a kettle full of dynamite cartridges in a larger pot containing hot water, and the whole was put on the stove in the boarding house in order to thaw out the explosive, when the dynamite exploded with terrific force, completely shattering the house. The names of the killed and injured are: Alexander McDonald of Truro, Finlay McDermid, James Hoffman and Edward Wessell killed, and Harry Hinds and Mary Harris injured. The scene of the accident presented a dreadful appearance and the bodies of the killed as they were recovered from the debris were terrible to behold.

OTHER PROVINCES.

Alberton P. E. I. has been troubled for a couple of years with periodical burglaries. Recently Detective Skelington of the I. C. R. hunted out the robbers, and found that there was an organized gang. Five are under arrest.

UNITED STATES.

A snow storm in Pennsylvania, caused the greatest blockade on railroads experienced since 1872. The Lehigh Valley road is blocked, and trains from Easton to Redding cannot proceed. All laborers between here and Mauch Chunk had been working from midnight Saturday to Sunday night shovelling snow. There is snow two feet deep on a level, three to five in drifts. Hundreds of coal, passenger and freight trains are blocked all over the state. At Somerville the snow is six feet deep; at Perth Amboy eight feet; in the drifts 15 feet.

Sewers in the vicinity of Washington, Jefferson and Clinton mills, at Rochester, N. Y., became filled with naphtha yesterday, while fourteen thousand gallons of naphtha were being pumped from the Vacuum oil works through the pipe line in the bed of the old canal. When the sewers became surcharged the gas began exploding, blowing out the manholes all over the city. The gas escaped into the mills, exploded and set the mills on fire. All three were burned. Many of the help jumped from the third story windows, and four were killed and twenty injured. The loss by fire is \$220,000. The loss by explosions throughout the city is unknown, but it is great.

The freight steamer "San Vincente," plying between San Francisco and Santa Cruz was burned Wednesday night off Pigeon Point, 40 miles south of the Golden Gate. The crew consisted of 19 officers and men. Capt. Charles Lewis, second mate, first mate and five sailors were rescued. Several suffered severely from exposure. One sailor died in a few hours. No trace has been found of the other 11 men.

Steamer Enterprise has been sent from the navy yard to look for the big Nova Scotia raft, which broke away from the steamer Miranda. The revenue cutter Grant will go on the same mission.

Steamer Samana, from Hayti, arrived at New York Wednesday and reports on the 6th inst. the heaviest storm experienced in 20 years prevailed on the Haytian coast. Several vessels were wrecked. All the vessels in Monte Christi were blown ashore.

A coastwise schooner capsized while entering Cape Haytien, and 13 of 15 men on board were drowned.

Schooner Viola, from Lunenburg for Jamaica, put into Turk's Island in distress. She was caught in a hurricane and sustained serious damage. A heavy sea washed the whole crew, including the captain, overboard; all except two, who were lost, were thrown back on the deck by the same wave.

Brig Nora, of Prince Edward Island, which arrived from Pedro, says she brought Capt. Hardy, Mate Burke, the cook and three seamen who belonged to the schooner Katie Ranger, of New Haven, which sank on the 18th 20 miles southeast of Absecon.

Additional details of the results of the recent blizzard prove it the worst known in Kansas. The number of deaths from freezing and starvation is believed to be at least sixty.

Seven coaches of the express for Chicago, on the Minnesota and Northwestern road, were wrecked Friday morning near Germany, Ill., and 40 passengers injured; five seriously, two perhaps fatally.

Among the bills introduced in the house was one by representative Boutelle, of Maine, appropriating \$60,000 for the construction of four bridges across the St. John and St. Francis rivers where they form the boundary between Maine and New Brunswick, provided the government of Canada appropriate a like sum.

BRITISH AND FOREIGN.

The Mexican government have granted extraordinary concessions to a real estate company to induce immigration to eleven states in Mexico. The company have obtained a title to 55,000,000 acres of land in Chihuahua, Sinaloa, Durango, Chihuahua, Zacatecas, Guanajuato, Tamaulipas, Vera, Cruz, Niveau, Galisco and Guerrero, and propose establishing agencies in all large cities in Europe and America. The government granted exemption from taxation to all settlers on these tracts which insures proper protection.

A VICTORY.

The supreme Court of the United States, by a majority of seven to one, has sustained the constitutionality of prohibition. This decision was handed down at Washington on Monday. The judgment is hailed by prohibitionists with universal joy. The decision sounds the doom of the dram-shops, distilleries and breweries, for it decides that prohibition States are not bound to compensate the liquor men, and that the closing of liquor nuisances by injunction is lawful. While many a fierce campaign has yet to be waged the prohibition army of the United States has the way now cleared, by this great judgment, for an onward march towards ultimate national victory.—Mont. Witness

TO DENVER IN ONE NIGHT.
