

News of the Week.

NEW BRUNSWICK.

On Tuesday last, Jacob Mullin, nearly eighty years of age, was found dead in a field near his home on the Northwest Miramichi. It is supposed that he fell while attempting to climb a fence, and from the fall received injuries that caused his death.

The Freight Traffic on the New Brunswick railway is increasing every day. Of late trains of 22 cars have been sent out of the yard bound for the west.

Therault's grist and carding mill, burnt at Edmundston Saturday night. No insurance; loss \$6,000.

Messrs. Simmons & Burpee have been awarded the contract for the re-construction of the Nerepis bridge swept away by the freshet last spring. The contract price is \$5,400.

There is a large number of new buildings in Moncton this season. The total expenditure for the season is about \$70,000, including \$9,000 on the Baptist church extension and improvement; \$12,000 on new railway shops, and \$7,000 on the basement of the new Roman Catholic stone church, which is to cost when completed \$40,000.

John McCann has been sentenced at St. Andrews to three years for larceny.

A Frenchman has been arrested at Kingston, Kent Co., for forging a draft for \$80 on the Merchants Bank at Halifax.

A Building Boom is expected at Dalhousie next spring. It is said that cottages will be erected for Sir John Macdonald, Hon. John Carling and other prominent men in the upper provinces.

While working at a planer in Messrs. McLachlan & Wilson's mill at Anagance, the sleeve of a man named Gogan got caught in some cog wheels and the man's arm was drawn into the machinery and crushed so badly that amputation above the elbow was found necessary.

The convict James Legg who escaped the other day from the Dorchester Penitentiary has been recaptured at Amherst, N. S., and taken back to prison.

A boy, 14 years old, named Jas. Robinson was accidentally shot on Wednesday in O'dell's grove, while carelessly handling a revolver. The bullet entered his thigh close to the body.

The Fredericton Electric Light Company gave the customers the light on Saturday night for the first time. It is a fine light, and everybody seemed well satisfied.

A barn, about a mile from Nashwaak bridge, belonging to Mr. Jas. Pickard, was burned Friday night. Forty tons of hay, some grain, and farming tools were destroyed. No insurance. Supposed to be incendiary.

Charles Chase & Sons' steam mill, situated about two miles above Hartland were burned Thursday night.

Says the Maple Leaf: The missing notes, amounting to about \$3,000, that were stolen a short time ago from Hon. John Lewis's safe, were found last Saturday morning by a young lad named Clarence Spencer. They had been hidden under the blacksmith shop along with the chisels used by the two burglars. Squire Lewis, it is rumored, rewarded the boy's honesty by a present of something like \$50.

The Gleaser says that, excepting in the case of ten or eleven property holders, the right of way has been obtained for the St. John Valley Railway without any difficulty from Eel River to Long's Creek.

A device to be practically tested this month on the I. C. R. is an electric signal by which, when occasion requires to stop the train, a button, on the inside or end of the car, is touched and the driver notified, instead of as at present, by pulling a cord.

Messrs. D. W. Hoogg & Co., of Portland, have packed this season in their New Brunswick shops 288,000 cans of corn and some 150,000 cans of beans, peas, etc. Their salmon pack has been unusually heavy, and lobster pack an average. They find a big market for their baked beans in Ontario.

NOVA SCOTIA.

In the Digby local election Robichau was elected by a majority of 187 over Doucette.

Thomas Quirk, who for 15 years had been in the employ of A. G. Jones & Co., of Halifax, as night watchman, was found drowned Tuesday morning.

Hon. Mr. McLellan, Post Master General, was elected by a large majority in Colchester on Thursday.

There seems to be something in that of John Crowe in Nova Scotia at any rate, as in a certain district in that province one individual indulges in the pleasure of having letters addressed to him as "John Crowe the sixteenth."

Some residents of the north side of Bras d'Or, C. B., who believed that one Kate McDonald, of that place, exercised the art of witchcraft and should be killed, attacked her house, armed with shot guns, but she kept them at bay with a revolver till some of the more intelligent people of the community came to the rescue.

A terrible accident happened in Manchester district, N. S., on Friday. A young man named Walter Hart, of that place, while out shooting, accidentally discharged a shot gun, lodging the contents in his arm near the shoulder, frightfully mutilating it and doing himself such serious damage that in all probability he will not live many days.

A mysterious shooting affair has occurred at Musquodoboit, N. S. After being missing for four days, Peter Doyle, a farmer, was found dead at the side of a roadway, with a bullet wound, the cause of death. The remains were discovered lying in a pool of blood, which flowed from the fatal wound. The man started on a shooting expedition last Sunday morning, but whether he went alone is at present unknown. Murder is suspected.

On Sunday morning Charles Murphy, with some other fellows, put up at the house of Francis Palmer, on the Chester road. The other young men went into the house, but Murphy stayed in the barn. About 2 o'clock in the morning the barn was discovered on fire. The livestock was got out, but all the hay was burnt and the farming implements. No person knew that Murphy was in the barn until his charred remains were found among the ashes. The men were the worse for liquor.

Mr. Robertson M. P. for Shelburne has been unseated. Irregularities by agents being acknowledged.

A young man named Alexander McDonald, who showed signs of insanity, was confined in Port Hood jail. During the night he set the jail on fire and was suffocated. The fire was subsequently extinguished.

OTHER PROVINCES.

An Ottawa despatch says, Immigration tables just compiled show a decided increase over last year. The number of immigrants settled in the Dominion during the nine months ended September was 62,000, as against 51,000 for the same period last year. The increase shown will be considerably augmented when returns are received from three or four ports including those on the Pacific coast.

Sir George Stephen will shortly leave for England to arrange terms with the Imperial government as to the mail contract and see to the building of steamers for the Pacific route. The Canadian Pacific, he says, has no intention of running steamers across the Atlantic.

A despatch from Winnipeg, says an agreement between Wann and Holt, contractors, and the local government for the completion of the boundary railway was ratified today and operations will be commenced at once.

Only this year have the Northwest cattle ranches had a surplus of cattle for export. Hitherto they have been adding to the number of their stock from year to year. Now some of the herds have attained such proportions that large sales are being made.

In Newfoundland there is great distress because of the lack of profitable employment for those who no longer find the fishing business remunerative. Yet though there is good agricultural land in the province nearly \$800,000 of farm products comes in yearly. Every dollar's worth of this provision, it is said, could be raised on the island. Agriculture is an almost untried experiment in Newfoundland, though the land lies idle in the interior and the inhabitants are many of them idle on the coast.

At the police court at Kingston, Ont., two incendiaries named Andrews and Newman pleaded guilty to three offences. On Monday night they started fires in a stable, the Salvation Army barracks and the Third Methodist church. The first and last were put out before much damage was done, but the barracks was completely destroyed, causing a loss of \$6000 with insurance of \$5000. The police suspected incendiarism, and after putting out the fire in the church remained in it, surmising that incendiaries would return to rekindle the fire, and in this they were correct, and the villains, who are both young men, were captured. They say they committed the crimes out of pure devilry and inspired by strong drink.

Two hundred thousand tons of coal in the C. P. R. sheds at Hochelaga have been burning since Saturday.

UNITED STATES.

The wheat crop of the United States will this year, it is thought, be not less than 430,000,000 bushels with a surplus of about 115,000,000 bushels for export.

A grand monument to Gen. Lee, the leading officer in the rebellion, was dedicated in Richmond, on Thursday.

On Wednesday at Leadbetter on the Houston and Texas Central railway, a train was nearly wrecked by a man who deliberately opened the switch and allowed the train to run into a gravel pit. The engine turned over and killed the fireman, all the others escaped. Three men were seen to mount horses, fire at the train and depart.

BRITISH AND FOREIGN.

War is imminent in Zululand against annexation to Natal. Sir Arthur Havelock, governor of Natal, with 1500 troops drafted from the colony, has started for the territory formerly possessed by Cetewayo, where the latter's son, Dinizulu, heads a rising.

A plot to assassinate Prince Ferdinand and M. M. Stambouloff and Natchevitch has been discovered. The plot originated with Slav committee at Odessa. An emissary of the committee has been arrested at Varna.

A sharp engagement has taken place on the frontier of Serbia between Albanian brigands who had attempted a raid into Serbia, and a force of frontier guards. Ten Serbians and twenty Albanians were killed.

The steamship Gaelic, just arrived from Hong Kong and Yokohama, reports that on Sept. 16, the Chinese transport Waylee was lost in Posca dores, and 280 Chinese and five Europeans were drowned. It is reported the steamer Anton encountered a typhoon and the second officer, and 24 Chinese, were washed overboard and drowned. Typhoons are reported from various places in the China sea. Nearly all the vessels arriving suffered.

An article in the Moscow Gazette referring to the results of the recent manoeuvres of the Russian reserves, excites renewed distrust. The tone of the article, explicitly official throughout, is a menace to Germany.

A terrible explosion occurred at a petroleum refinery Dunkirk, France. Several persons perished and seven were seriously burned.

Sir William Vernon Harcourt, speaking at Portsmouth, denied that it was possible to shelve the Irish question, which came back always with renewed force. Coercion would not settle the question. It was like the fabled hydra—when one head was cut off another would grow. Lord Churchill told them the trouble would be all over in six months—coercion was doing it. But he wouldn't take that ghost's word for a thousand pounds. (Laughter.) Churchill was not the man to know public duties with so much prescience as to justify confidence in his predictions. The coercion act was already a dead failure. Other governments have failed after trying coercion. The present government failed before it began to apply coercion. Nobody believed the Unionist gatherings represented any section of the Liberal party. They were really Tory meetings, got together to cheer up deserters. The Unionists were played out; that fact their leaders knew, and as shown in recent speeches, they lost temper over it.
