## DENOMINATIONAL NEWS.

FROM REV. E. CROWELL. — In a private note Bro. Crowell says, —

"The F. B. Church at Advocate, Cumberland Co. had over twenty members when I left them after spending two Sundays. They are on a good, substantial basis, and report progress since organization. Rev. J. I. Porter passed through Yarmouth this week to visit Kings and Cumberland Counties."

ENTERTAINMENT AT CHEGOGGIN. — Last Tuesday evening, the Free Baptist Sunday School of Chegoggin, gave a very successful entertainment in their hall, to a full house. Mr. Tully Wyman, superintendent, conducted the exercises; and Miss Hattie Corning, organist of the school, furnished the instrumental music. Too much praise could not be bestowed upon either of these officers, nor upon the committee who provided the floral decorations. As the programme contained twenty-seven exercises, such as recitations, speeches, concerted pieces, with solos, quartets, and choruses, it is impossible to mention special excellencies here. All went merrily and to the satisfaction of the audience, until three wee lassies sang a "Good bye Song," and the pastor sent us home with his benediction. Yarmouth and this vicinity were well represented. —Yarmouth Times.

THE RUSSIAN ARMY. — The official report on the Russian Army lately published contains the following particulars. On the 1st of January, 1883, there were 824,762 men, including 8,000 volunteers in the active army. The reserve amounted to 1,693,815 in addition, thus making a total of 2,425,577 soldiers whom Russia could bring into the field at need. In Germany the maximum of the regular army and the Landwehr combined is computed at 1,800,000 men. Moreover Russia has at its disposal 2,160,000 militia liable to be called upon in time of war to recruit the ranks of the regular army. The number of young men annually liable to the conscription is 152,000, of whom about one half are exempted by lot. If the term of service were reduced from five to three years the State would in a short time be able to have 4,000,000 regular troops without having recourse to the militia reserves. The Russian journals refer with jubilation to these practically inexhaustible resources as compared with other countries. At present there is no such thing as a force of irregulars, but it is pointed out that nuclei for troops of that description exist in ample measure among the tribes of Central Asia, of the Caucasus, and of the Transcaucasian provinces. —London Times.

BLOOD WANTED! — Here is the wildest kind of wild statements and threats. The Irish Republican League of the United States has made the following "proclamation":

Whereas, the England Government wilfully, deliberately, and with malice, aforethought, are now engaged in seizing American ships and holding their crews as prisoners, under threats and starvation; and whereas, the English Government acted in like manner last year, but more signally so on one occasion, when the captain of a British war ship seized and forced into a Canadian port an American ship and did then and there haul down the United States flag aboard the United States ship, in defiance of the protests of her captain; and whereas, the English Government has failed to apologize for these disgraceful and malicious outrages against her beloved flag; and whereas, no substantial redress has been obtained at the hands of an Anglo-maniac president, associated with a Cabinet the majority of which are extreme Anglo-maniacs, and therefore more English than the English themselves;

Therefore we, the I. R. Legion of the United States, do hereby firmly resolve that the honor of our glorious republic must be upheld, and,

Therefore, we notify all good citizens not to go down to the sea on English ships or patronize them in any way, as all English ships entering or leaving any port in the United States are thereby declared liable to seizure, attack or destruction from this 1st day of August, and shall so continue until the English Government shall make ample and satisfactory apology to the United States.

Such crazy ravings provoke laughter.

PRESENTATION. — Rev. James Gray, who has retired from the pastorate of Sussex Presbyterian church, a position, he filled with credit for a period of thirty years, was on Wednesday night presented with a flattering address accompanied by a pair of gold spectacles and a check for \$160.

The associate alumni of Acadia college propose to contribute \$500 for the coming year toward the salary of the new professor of modern languages.

PERSONAL. — Hon. Geo. E. Foster spent Sabbath and two following days in this city. His old friends gave him a hearty welcome. Dr. Foster MacFarland, of Fairville, was presented, Friday night, with a gold-headed cane and an address by his friends in that village. He will leave for Boston this week.

UNNECESSARY WORRY. — Young ministers sometimes give themselves unnecessary trouble. One of them heard a man say that "he did not admire him." For two days and nights he slept not, neither did he eat — much. At last a wise brother asked the cause of his sadness. He confessed, whereupon the wise brother sprang from his seat, shook the young preacher warmly by the hand, and said: "I congratulate you; his admiration would be your destruction; his disapprobation is very complimentary." So it proved. —Advocate.

## Temperance Notes.

—The Sultan of Morocco has prohibited the sale of intoxicants, and has abolished the state tobacco monopoly. The Moorish tobacco and snuff shops have been closed. Large quantities of leaf tobacco have been publicly burned by the Sultan's order. Several Moors were stripped and flogged for smoking in defiance of the Sultan's order.

—Rum, says Judge Noah Davis, is responsible for three-fourths of all the crime committed. This statement is confirmed by other eminent judges. If this be true what proportion of the taxes paid by temperance men goes to foot the bills incurred by rum-crazed criminals?

—A recent Paris telegram mentions that in a discussion in the French Senate upon the report of the Committee on Consumption of Spirits, M. Claude said that the committee had come to the conclusion that "the drinking of spirits in France had come to such a height as to be a social danger." France is a wine-drinking country, in which we have so often been told that American travellers "see no drunkenness"! In the light of the recent discussion in the French Senate it is quite obvious that an abundance of wine serves rather to whet the appetite for the stronger liquors than as a "cure for drunkenness."

—The Women's Temperance Publication Association of Chicago, was founded less than seven years ago by women, and is controlled by them. It is a joint company, with shares at twenty-five dollars each, which must all be held in the name of white ribboners. Its finances have so prospered that it has for the last two years declared a dividend of four per cent. The first and five per cent, the second year. It employs four editors, and has a total of sixty persons on its pay roll. Its type is nearly all set by women, and it published last year nearly thirty millions of pages of temperance literature, and this year will not publish less than fifty millions.

—The last Legislature of Minnesota enacted a "high-licence" law, fixing the license fee at \$1,000. That it does not prove adequate for the prevention of drunkenness is apparent from the testimony of the St. Paul Pioneer Press, which in a recent number says: "There are so many drunken men on the streets as to attract attention. For they are met on almost every crossing, in the street-cars and other localities where we would be just as well pleased not to meet them." In the light of this remarkable statement concerning the prevalence of drunkenness, the experience of St. Paul with "high license," whatever may be its revenue results, cannot be very reassuring to those who looked hopefully to it as a temperance measure.


