-The Winnipeg Sun says : The Presbyterians have been making rapid progress in Manitoba. From 1881 to

1886, they exhibited an increase of 15,000 or 104 per cent., and had passed from second place to a decided lead. In the same period of time the adherents of the Church of England increased from 13,715 to 23,306, and the Methodists from 9,382 to 14,648. Of the larger denominations, the Roman Catholics show the least increase, only twenty-five per cent., the reason being

that this church has benefited to a smaller extent than the others from the large immigration into the country since 1881.

Journals conducted in the interests of the rum-sellers deny the rights of any one to interfere with a man who wishes to buy and to drink any bever-




