

News of the Week.

NEW BRUNSWICK.

George Stevenson, who, was severely injured by being knocked from a train while passing Kirk & Daniel's mill, last June, has retained Harrison & Pugsley to bring an action for damages against the New Brunswick railway and the St. John bridge and railway company.

The people of Campbellton held a meeting, Friday evening, and decided, with but three dissenting votes, to apply for an act incorporating the town.

Train men and others from the north say that when the country in the vicinity of Jacquet River and Campbellton is reached, one could fancy himself in another country, there being considerable snow.

In Salisbury on Wednesday two hotels were burned—the Commercial and the Salisbury. The fire began in the first named, and is supposed to have been caused by a child having thrown a piece of lighted birch bark between the partitions in the Commercial building.

The Freestone shipments from the Miramichi, says the Chatham World, have been something enormous this year. Some Hamilton, Ontario, men who require a large amount of stone, have been examining the Miramichi quarries.

At McAdam Junction the people are having considerable trouble with some one who poisons dogs. Strachine has been used and about 30 canines have been poisoned this fall.

A Bathurst special says that an old man named Tom Sargent is suspected of setting fire to Mr. Sutherland's barn, burned Friday night—but no constable can be found who is brave enough to arrest him.

Mr. Rideout, government inspecting engineer, has finished his inspection of the Fredericton bridge. He expressed himself well pleased with the work. The masonry work is expected to be completed on the 19th inst. The truss work will be put up during February and March.

The "cheap cloth fiend" has again made his appearance in York county. It will be remembered that some five years ago this province was flooded with shoddy goods and many farmers were literally swindled out of from \$40 to \$100 each.

The duty collected at the port of Moncton in October amounted to \$42,410.19, against \$37,642.52 in the same month of last year—increase \$4,767.57.

A few months ago the public school accommodation in Moncton was equal to all demands made upon it; but to-day there are a considerable number of children who cannot obtain permits to enter the schools because the accommodation is insufficient.

John Carter's mill, Bathurst, was destroyed by fire on Tuesday. Loss \$5,000, insured in Cutter's company for \$2,000.

The Moncton W. C. T. U. have purchased for \$1,600 the lot recently sold to the Merchants' Bank, of Halifax.

The river froze over here Saturday night.

Morrison's Mill is to run all winter sawing shingles. The Mill has six shingle machines now, and two more are to be put in.

The Fredericton Boom Company's returns show that 100,000 feet of lumber have been rafted this year.

Mr. Benj. Everett, of Kingsclear, has bought Long's hotel, from Mr. Geo. Hume. Mr. E. is to take charge on the first of April.

In the Woodstock Albert street Baptist church on Wednesday 55 squares of glass were broken, including 29 squares of stained glass window. It is supposed to have been done by some boys.

W. A. Park M. P. P. has been appointed collector of customs at Newcastle. This makes a vacancy in the representation of Northumberland in the Local Legislature.

NOVA SCOTIA.

Detective Power, who has been investigating the shooting of Peter Doyle, in Halifax County, N. S., announces that the man was evidently accidentally shot by his own fowling piece.

The session of the Provincial Normal School, Truro, opened on Thursday. The attendance is large, not likely to fall short of 150.

Up to date this year 69 cargoes of fish have been shipped to the West Indies from Lunenburg.

It is proposed to form a company with a capital of \$2,500,000 to establish a line of steamships between Halifax and Jamaica.

The Elderslie woollen mills, a mile and a half from Westville, N. S., were burned to the ground Friday night. They were purchased over a year ago by Mr. Peter Graham, of New Glasgow. They were superintended by Kerr Brothers, whose mills were set on fire by a man named McKenzie, about a dozen years ago. Three years ago they were again burned down. The mills were then moved nearer Westville and rebuilt. After this their dam gave away during a freshet and the property changed hands. The present loss is \$15,000.

A company has been formed in Yarmouth which will erect a new summer hotel there, to be ready in time for the reception of next season's visitors. It is to cost about \$20,000.

Residents of Musquodoboit harbor have experienced a reign of terror, caused by the depredations and outrages of a number of daring miscreants, who attack travellers on the highway at night. They came near murdering a well known physician recently. Night robberies, house breaking and burglaries of stores are common occurrences.

Some of the launch-ways of the big raft at Two Rivers, N. S., were carried away by the recent storms and high tides and the launching will be delayed in consequence.

The peaceable residents of Musquodoboit harbor and the adjoining district of Jeddore, N. S., are experiencing each a reign of terror, caused by the thefts and outrages of a number of daring scoundrels, that they hardly dare go out after dark. On one night recently, four houses were broken into and robbed.

An ejection in Cape Breton, recently, probably saved the lives of a small family. The North Sydney Herald says, on Saturday a family were ejected from a small house on the railroad for non-payment of rent. On Monday a squall of wind blew the house down.

The Joggins railway was opened with all due pomp and ceremony Thursday. Sir Charles Tupper and a number of other prominent men were there. The new road is said to be well built.

The Baptist church at Bear River, N. S., was seriously damaged by fire last week.

A construction train on the Pictou branch railway went off the track on Tuesday, tearing up the rails for about 50 feet. The tender was thrown into the water. J. T. Paulin, who was riding on the tender, was badly injured. The engineer and fireman escaped unhurt.

An ocean steamship in the Basin of Minas is a new and striking feature in direct trade. Cornwallis apple shippers tired of supplementing ocean freight to England with freight charges to Halifax, are trying the experiment of loading the steamship Belair at Kingsport for England. The ship is now safely taking in her cargo under the shadow of Blomidon.

Capt. Isaac Smith, coast pilot on the steamer City of St. John, dropped dead on that steamer Tuesday. He has been following the sea for sixty years.

OTHER PROVINCES.

A suit for \$40,000 damages has been entered by the Dominion government against the owners of the vessel which recently ran down and sank the lightship at the Lower Traverse.

The Manitoba census furnishes an answer to the complaint that no great progress is made there. The increase in population in the five years ending 1886 is 75 per cent. The number of acres under cultivation trebled in the same period. The wheat crop of 1887 is six times, and that of 1887 about twelve times that of 1881.

Admiral Heneage has gone to Victoria, B. C. The admiral goes to hoist his flag on board of the Swiftsure, the new flagship of the Pacific squadron. He said one of his first official acts would be to visit the Alaskan waters and protect British interests there, which sadly needed looking after. He would not, he said, allow British vessels to be molested outside of the three mile limit, no matter who attempted it.

The November report of the Ontario bureau of industries states that the yield of fall wheat is 5,000,000 bushels below the average of six years; spring wheat is 4,000,000 below; barley, 2,000,000; oats, 9,000,000 less than last year; peas 4,000,000 less than last year.

UNITED STATES.

At Louisville, Ky., Thursday night, Charles B. Brownfield, a dissipated man, cut off the heads of his wife and child, cut the throat of his brother-in-law, Wm. Brunner, from ear to ear, and hanged himself to the ceiling. He left a note saying that gambling caused the tragedy.

In St. Louis an explosion in a grocery store demolished it and two adjoining brick buildings, and twelve persons were buried in the ruins.

There is a water famine through the western tiers of Ohio counties and adjoining territory of Indiana. Upon table lands and extended level stretches away from the larger streams, cattle are suffering and bellowing for drink. Farm village wells are dry, and other wells are at a low stage, the water breeding typhoid fever and kindred diseases. Scores of smaller water power mills are stopped for three months. Many steam mills are running short time or shut down. Fall wheat and barley have had a spindling growth.

Thirteen rooms at the Arlington Hotel, Washington, have been engaged for the use of the fishery commission.

The peanut harvest of Virginia is estimated at \$1,000,000 bushels.

A storm at Norfolk, Va., on Sunday and Monday was most disastrous and damaging. At least 50 vessels are ashore, and many will be total wrecks. No lives are reported lost.

The buildings belonging to Amos Cook, one and one half miles from Houlton were burned last week, together with forty tons of hay, six hundred bushels of oats, farming tools, six cows, and fourteen cords of prepared wood. The fire was probably caused by tramps.

The Supreme Court has denied the writ of error in the Anarchist cases. The decision was announced by Chief Justice Waite in a long, carefully prepared opinion. Unless the Governor of Illinois commutes their sentence they will be executed, as they certainly deserve to be.

BRITISH AND FOREIGN.

O'Brien, the editor of *United Ireland*, is in jail, his sentence having been confirmed. He will stay three months, and is being treated like all the other prisoners.

Scarlet fever is prevalent in London. There were 1900 cases in the hospitals last week.

The English cooperatives have a bank whose transactions amount to \$80,000,000 a year. Their 900,000 members receive an annual profit of \$15,000,000, or an average of \$16 1/2 each. Their profits during the last twenty-four years have been \$50,000,000.

Twenty one persons, charged with obstructing evictions at Ballykerrigue, Ire., have been sentenced to various terms of imprisonment. Six moonlighters have been arrested at Ardferd for shooting a farmer.

The emperor of China has given two million taels for the improvement of the Yellow River. The floods by the overflow of the river recently caused the loss of a thousand lives and an immense amount of property.

An attempt was made Wednesday afternoon to blow up the Carlton club. The explosion was in the basement and blew out all the first floor windows and injured four persons. The Carlton is the most beautiful club house in London. The members include most of the members of the houses of lords and commons.

The English cabinet, has resolved to continue the present vigorous policy in Ireland, especially as regards speeches at proclaimed meetings.

A despatch from St. Petersburg says another Nihilist plot has been discovered. The headquarters were in the house of an apothecary named Schuppe, in Joketermerhof Prospect. The police raided the house and made several arrests. They also found a number of bombs.
