Other bills were introduced as follows: By Mr. Wilson, amending the incorporation act of the town of Marysville; by Mr. Humphrey, amending the incorporation act of the Moncton gas light and water co;

Hon. Mr. Blair committed the bill respecting the sale of intoxicating liquors, Mr. Palmer in the chair. The bill has upwards of 145 sections and many sub-sections. Mr. Blair said that hon. members were, to some extent, familiar with the liquor license legislation passed in the province of Ontario and that passed by the dominion parliament in 1883. adopted in the places named, and he did not think there would be found much room for discussion. The bill only intends two kinds of licensestavern and wholesale. It is intended to limit the number of licenses, and outside of towns and cities persons, in addition to other requirements, are required to furnish such accommodations as are necessary for guests and horses.
