

## News of the Week.

## NEW BRUNSWICK.

The sale of fishing leases in New Brunswick has been postponed until March 30.

The old Heron house situated at Heron Lake, was destroyed by fire, Sunday evening.

The Caledonia gold mines, in Queen's Co. N. S., give employment to 75 men. These mines are reported to be paying exceedingly well.

Some miscreant, a few days ago placed a heavy sleeper across the truck of the Intercolonial railway near St. Joseph, with the intention of wrecking a train. Fortunately it was discovered.

During February there have been extensive shipments of potatoes to the United States over the N. B. Railway from McAdam Junction. Within the past 15 days 65,000 bushels were forwarded.

On Thursday Wm. T. Macaulay, met with a painful accident in Allan Bros' foundry. He was working at a lathe when his right hand was crushed by coming in contact with the machinery. The flesh from the back of the hand was almost peeled off.

The Dominion Cruiser Vigilant is now cruising between Point Lepreau and St. Andrews Bay. A large lot of American buyers are in these waters and herring which are fairly plentiful, bring 35 cents per hundred.

It is stated that the St. Martin's and Upham R. R. has been sold to a company composed of New Brunswick and New York men. And the plan is said to include the building of a large summer hotel at St. Martins.

An unfortunate accident was met with by Joseph Miller in Christie's factory, St. John, Saturday afternoon, by which his right arm was so injured that he will lose it. He was endeavoring to adjust the gauge of the circular saw when his hand came in contact with it and the saw split his arm from wrist to elbow.

A man named David Brown formerly of Queens Co. but lately of Duluth, eloped with a young woman, and came to this city a couple of weeks ago. There whereabouts became known and the man's wife followed him, arriving here on Wednesday. The girl was arrested at the instance of her father who arrived here on Monday to take her home.

## NOVA SCOTIA.

Chas. W. Nis, ex-sheriff of Hants Co., N. S., died on Sunday.

The Joggins coal mining association have met and decided to sell the mines. It is said to be likely the mines will be purchased at an early date by an American company.

On Tuesday, 15th inst., a big fire broke out in Wolfville, N. S., and the handsome residence of John W. Barss was burned. The furniture was saved in part. The loss is estimated at \$8,000. Insurance, \$4,000.

The schooner Wioma, from Cornwallis for Boston, with a cargo of potatoes, got caught in the ice at Painsboro, Sunday, and upset and filled with water. The crew managed to tow the vessel inside the bar and beach her. The cargo is badly damaged.

The body of James Stokes, a farm laborer, was found in Cornwallis river in Kentville, Wednesday. The body was much bruised, the result of a drunken row Tuesday night. After the row, Stokes, from fear, ran across the dyke, and is supposed to have been drowned while attempting to cross the river on the ice.

The Farmer's Review says: Injury to winter wheat by reason of the recent sleet storms accompanying cold weather is reported from various portions of Illinois, Indiana, Missouri and Kansas, but the general situation as affecting the prospects of winter wheat continues to be favorable.

## OTHER PROVINCES.

Five men, named John Benton, Thos. Woodruff, Julius Bagot, Wm. Carver and James McCormack were killed to-day, and two others seriously injured at the Wilbur mines Ontario, by a fall of earth from the roof.

## UNITED STATES.

The melting snow caused great floods last week in Illinois. South Chicago was also badly flooded.

The worst storm of the winter prevailed throughout the Northwest Friday. The telegraph service west of Omaha and St. Paul was completely cut off. At Minneapolis and St. Paul nearly all the trains on the lines north, west and south of Minneapolis were abandoned. The Northern Pacific, Manitoba and Hastings and Dakota lines were entirely blocked.

The snow sheds at Blue Canyon, Nevada, collapsed on Thursday. A conductor, a brakeman, the roadmaster and one other person are missing.

High wind on Friday carried away two spans of the bridge over the Genesee river while a number of persons were crossing, and several lives were lost.

A family consisting of Mr. Amidon, his wife, two girls and an infant narrowly escaped death by poisoning a few days ago at Hartford, Conn., after eating corned beef and cabbage.

Secretary of the Treasury Manning has placed his resignation in the hands of the president to take effect on the appointment and qualification of his successor.

The senate has passed the bill for the increase of the naval establishment. It appropriates \$15,000,000 for the construction of ten iron cruisers of a maximum speed of 20 knots per hour, and \$4,800,000 for their armament.

A large four-story building at Tompkinsville, S. C., was set on fire by lightning during a thunder storm Friday evening and burned, with adjoining warehouses, and 10,000 bales of cotton. The loss is estimated at \$350,000.

In Arkansas seven men are charged with hanging two men named Williams and Morgan and a boy named Moon, on the 15th of June, 1885, near Healdton. The two men were in custody on a charge of horse stealing, and the boy happened along when the lynching was in progress. It is stated that the lynching party hung him also to keep him from becoming a witness. They are men of some prominence.

## BRITISH AND FOREIGN.

The corporation of Belfast has awarded £4,511 compensation for damage inflicted in recent riots in that city.

At Abbey-Feale, seven farmers and two women have been committed for trial for throwing scalding water upon the sheriff who were endeavoring to effect evictions.

The Bavarian rifle factory at Amberg is working with feverish haste on government orders. It supplies repeaters for one regiment every week.

The government acting on information that the people of the counties of Clare and Limerick have a plentiful supply of firearms, has ordered the mounting and manning of artillery at all the forts on the Shannon, some of which have not been occupied for years.

On Friday a box of dynamite, with a burning fuse attached, was found by a policeman on the window-sill of the recorder of Galway's house in Kildysart. The recorder was giving a dinner party to two magistrates and other guests. The policeman quenched the fuse.

At Killarney on Monday, one hundred starving laborers, headed by the parish priest, appeared before the Board of Guardians and prayed for pork or relief. The board resolved to apply to the government for assistance and subscribed for a hearty meal for the sufferers.

The governor of Afghan Turkistan, has advised from the Ameer saying that Russian officers and a company of Bokharian troopers are surveying for the purpose of bridging the Amu Daria, near Kulport, and that a Russian advance is threatened between Kunduz and Balkh.

The withdrawal of the annual subvention to Egypt has not been formally decided upon. Sir Evelyn Baring, British diplomatic agent at Cairo, has informed Count d'Aulay, the French agent, that Sir Henry Drummond Wolfe's proposals imply neither immediate recalling of British troops nor fixing of a date for their withdrawal from Egypt.

The Loyalist paper, the Union, published in Dublin, says that all the tenants on the Bodley estate, where evictions are pending, are armed with enfield rifles, and that a few days ago a Fenian visited the locality and provided the tenants with a plentiful supply of ball cartridges. The same paper says a force of 1,000 policemen and soldiers will accompany the sheriff through the district which is in a state of civil war.

The whole country from Lyons to Muir is a scene of desolation. Many merchants have been unable to visit their stores since Thursday morning, and several who attempted it were swept down by the current and narrowly escaped death. All the merchants lose heavily. All the manufacturing establishments are crippled and many buildings ruined. The ice gorge shows no signs of breaking; it is a solid glacier five miles long and 15 or 30 feet thick. The loss of property will doubtless reach \$150,000.

All the French troops have been recalled from Madagascar, except four companies which are to remain at Diego Suarez.

Questions asked the Austrian Government in the Reichsrath in relation to the proposed credit for military purposes, elicited the information that Hungary would only enrol in the Landsturm such men as already had military training or were likely to make good soldiers. Numerous exemptions would be made. In Austria the enrolment of men under the age of 42 years would be almost universal. Ex-officers up to the age of 60 years would also be enrolled. It is semi-officially stated that an Austro-Hungary treaty to continue ten years will be arranged and will go into operation in 1888.

The Mormons are becoming aggressive. A late dispatch from Delavan, Wis., says: "A Mormon missionary named Cooper has been so successful in his exhortations in East Delavan that ground has been given for a church site, and a considerable sum of money contributed for the erection of a suitable house of worship."

According to the printed design, the new statue of Queen Victoria by Mr. Boehme, which is to be erected at Windsor, will represent Her Majesty clad in her royal robes, wearing a small crown and lace veil, and her sash and insignia of the Garter, and holding in her right hand a sceptre and in her left an orb. It will be cast in bronze, on a pedestal of polished red granite. The Queen's New Year's gifts to the poor of Windsor included a thousand prime joints of beef and a hundred tons of coal.

For a number of years past the Pennsylvania Railroad has been making experiments to ascertain how far it would pay to give up travel on the Sabbath. Numerous excursion trains and a number of passenger trains have been taken off, and from eight o'clock on Saturday night till midnight on Sunday, all freight trains, except live stock trains, have been ordered off. All repairing at the shops has also been stopped on Sunday. The results have proved so exceedingly satisfactory, that the directors very wisely, we think, intend permanently to introduce and extend these changes.
