News of the Week.

NEW BRUNSWICK.

George Morrel and Henry Greer, of Oak Bay, found in one of their traps, recently, a bear caught by the leg. They teased him until he broke loose and tore the two men severely. Morrel despatching him with a pistol shot just in time to escape being killed.

The local election to fill the vacancy for Northumberland caused by the resignation of Mr. Park, takes place Dec. 13th; nomination 6th.

Wm. Elward and John Gaudet escaped from Richibucto jail, Monday night. Elward was serving a three months' sentence for assault; Gaudet was waiting trial for forgery.

The Temperance Hall at Norton, Kings county, was burned to the ground Wednesday morning, paraphernalia of the I. O. G. T., a lot of school books and a cabinet organ being destroyed with it. Prosecutions under the Scott act were to have taken place therein. There is suspicion of incendiarism.

Mazaire Lantegne, a Frenchman, was present at the opening of the Carquet railway, and while stepping from one car to another fell between them, the wheels passing over his head, severing it from the body. His death was instantaneous.

Mr. R. A. Estey has three electric lights running in his saw mill and one in his lumber yard adjoining.

Hon. Wm. Kelly, M. L. C., of Chatham, has been removed by his son to St. John, for medical care and nursing. He is threatened with paralysis of the brain.

Some idea of the raspberry business on the Grand Falls branch, N. B. R., can be gathered from the fact the \$7,500 worth were shipped from Edmundston alone: \$3,000 by Mr. Dayton, \$2,500 by T. M. Richards and \$2,000 by Michaud Bros. of Frenchville. The price paid was 4 cents per lb.—Gleaner.

At Hillsboro, A. Co, Jordan Steeves' barn was burned on Tuesday. It contained 35 or 40 tons of hay.

H. G. & F. A. Marr's milinery establishment in Moncton was burned Wednesday evening.

The following new post offices were opened on the 1st of November:—Bannister, Albert Co., Henry J. Steeves, postmaster; Camperdown, Collingwood, York, Andrew Hersey, postmaster; East Apple River, Queens, C. C. Forbes, postmaster; Middleton, Dorchester, West Co., R. A. Colpitts, postmaster; Phunwesep, Studholm, Kings, Wm. M. Teaples, postmaster. The name of the post office at Kilburn's Landing, Victoria, has been changed to Kilburn.

A fire at St. Stephen, gutted a wooden building owned by the Bartlett estate, and occupied by Charles E. Miller.

John Moore and D. W. Hartt, of Fredericton Junction, have started for Ireland to look after the Carlyle estates to which Mrs. Moore has fallen heir.

Mr. Barker, of the government stock farm, says the harvest this year will be up to expectations. Potatoes are a failure, because of rot, but he has raised over 1,500 bushels of turnips.

On and after the first of January next, the new law relating to the recording of marriages will come into force.

J. C. Risteen & Co. are erecting a large dryhouse to give additional room for their lumber.

Sanford Burden, a young man of Bear Island, died suddenly in the woods in St. Pamphili, Que., on Friday.

The Government have decided to erect an iron trestle bridge on the division of the Red Head road. The bridge will be about fifty feet long.

The Fredericton Electric Light Company are talking of introducing the incandescent lighting system.

A quantity of raw cotton for the Marysville factory arrived Friday, and the operatives resumed work this morning. The factory had been shut down for about two weeks owing to the non arrival of the material.

In the St. John Circuit Court a verdict was given in the case of Alice Abbie E. Gilmer vs the city of St. John. This was an action brought by the plaintiff to recover damages for an injury sustained in walking along one of the sidewalks of the city. The verdict was for \$2,000.

NOVA SCOTIA.

A violent insane man named Donald McNeil was taken from Bay St. Lawrence, C. B., on his way to Mount Hope asylum, Dartmouth. The unfortunate man was strongly addicted to the use of intoxicating drinks and while in a drunken spree burnt a large roll of bills, which is said to be the cause of his insanity.

New Glasgow is proud of its new water works system. It cost \$58,000.

Truro is infested with diphtheria.

Election writs have been issued for Shelburne and Yarmouth: Nomination day 8th; election day, 15th December.

McDonald's majority over Campbell in Cape Breton was about 500.

At Baddeck, C. B. on the 22nd inst., the store of C. R. Hart & Co., the dwelling house and store of D. J. McRae and the shop of W. A. Robertson were burned to the ground. McRae was the only person insured.

A young man, Gilbert Crowell was drowned at Port La Tour a few days ago, by the upsetting of a boat. His brother who was with him, managed to hold on to the boat till rescued.

The labor question is being solved in Amherst by importing servant girls from Newfoundland. Saturday night's Quebec express from Halifax brought seven, all of whom had places secured for them in Amherst prior to their arrival.

A young colored woman, Miss Howells, outstripped all her competitors in the recent Halifax county academy examinations. Her average was 93, a figure not reached by any other candidate for admission.

The French steamer Iberia, the first boat of the Bossiere line to Halifax, arrived there Tuesday morning from Hamburg and Havre. She has 12,000 bags of sugar for the Nova Scotia refinery.

No answer has yet been received from the Archbishop of Canterbury stating who he and the Archbishop of York and the Bishop of London have decided on as the successor to the late Bishop.

OTHER PROVINCES.

Ontario legislature will be opened during the last week in January.

During the ten months of the current year 16,286 immigrants have arrived in Manitoba and the Northwest, being 6,221 more than the total immigration for the whole of last year.

A scheme has been proposed at Winnipeg to bring out seventy-five thousand Icelanders yet remaining in their native country.

UNITED STATES.

Special advices from Indian Territory and Southern Kansas bring news of a terrible state of affairs in that country consequent on the long drought, and the prairie fires that have ensued. For the last seven months people living in a section two hundred miles square have been hoping and praying for rain to relieve their sufferings. In all directions can be seen a glare of prairie fires, which are sweeping everything. The sun is obscured by the dense smoke. At Red Fork an area of forty square miles has been burned, destroying millions of tons of hay and many agricultural implements. Several hundred head of cattle have been destroyed and two ranches swept clear of every vestige of human life. Along the southern border of Kansas the inhabitants are leaving by hundreds.

All the wells and streams in the country are drying up and people are beginning to realize that the only salvation is to seek some other place and are leaving the result of years of toil and going back to the Eastern States.

A St. Louis despatch says Reports of forest and prairie fires come from all directions excepting north and give accounts of great destruction of property. The bottom lands of Okawa and the big Muddy rivers in southwestern Illinois and the prairies in many parts of the same sections of the state are ablaze, and outhouses, fences, farming machinery, outstanding crops and whole forests, and in some cases residences have been destroyed. In southeastern Missouri and Arkansas, between the Iron Mountain Railway and Mississippi river, swamps and lowlands have been almost burned out and the whole country is filled with smoke. As far west as Hot Springs, fires have devastated farms, and burned residences, barns and fences.

A few days ago Henry Lockwood and family, who reside near Marion, Ind., were compelled by a terrible blizzard to spend the night with a neighbor. They had left three children, aged 8 years, 4 years and 18 months, at home. The youngest child was frozen to death, and the other two so numbed that they could hardly speak or move.

H. A. Mansur's shingle mill about two miles from Houlton, was burned Saturday with 175,000 shingles. Loss about \$3,000. No insurance.

Two lepers are under medical treatment in Philadelphia, a mother, forty-five years of age, and her daughter. The woman, a native of this state, married a sea captain, with whom she made voyages to all parts of the world. Her husband contracted the horrible malady and died of it in Brazil. His wife and daughter were also stricken with the disease.

Counterfeit U. S. postal cards have been discovered in Pittsburg, Pa., which are so skillfully executed that their detection is very difficult. This is the first attempt to put spurious postal cards in circulation. It is thought that they come from New York.

Marion Robertson and James Bromley, white boys, 17 years old, have been sentenced to the Texan penitentiary for life for having murdered Archie Henry, their companion, into a cave and there murdered him. The three boys ran away from home and confederated together for the purpose of highway robbery and stealing. Young Henry informed the authorities of their thefts, for which his associates killed him.

BRITISH AND FOREIGN.

M. Grevey, President of France, has resigned. France is just now in a good deal of commotion.

Extraordinary precautions have been taken to guard the dynamites, Callan and Harkins, in prison. In

the dust holes of Callan's lodgings were found thirty pounds of dynamite, and other explosive compounds were found buried in the neighbors' gardens.

Two thousand crofters on the Isle of Lewis have been supplied with rifles, tents, etc., and have commenced a campaign to exterminate the deer in forests. They allege that 60,000 crofters are starving who ought to be living on the land now given up to deer. They declare that in adopting the present course they are actuated by sheer necessity.

So serious is the rabbit pest in New South Wales that the government of that colony offers a reward of £25,000 to any man who will devise a means of exterminating these animals. This seems a large figure, but it is to be considered that under the present bounty system some £150,000 has been already paid by the government in ineffectual efforts to destroy the rabbits. They are increasing, and are represented to be almost as intolerable as the ten plagues of Egypt.

A semi-official denial is given to the statement of the Berlin Post that there is immediate prospect of an Austro-Russian war. It is stated that nothing has lately happened to increase the danger, and official circles are convinced that war between Russia and Austria alone is an impossibility, because if Austria were assailed Germany and Italy would be bound to assist. The inevitable result would be a general conflagration Europe.
