

I would consider it a favor to have you send me a copy.

Thus the conversation went on. I cannot but believe that if the Bible had a good circulation among these native gentlemen it would result in the salvation of many of them. Let me ask again all the Free Baptists of N. B. to pray for the English work in Balasore.

This leads to one or two important items of business I wish to bring before the people. You will see that there is need of a book room here. I have arranged to open a small hall in the bazaar sometime in July and would like to put \$200 worth of English and Oriya Bibles, and religious books in it. Somebody or some church or Sunday-school, I feel sure, would be glad to send us \$200 for the purpose. It need not come all at once \$50 quarterly for a year would supply the need nicely.

Secondly: You will all remember that Purna Chandra Basu who was supported here for a number of years by N. B., died about a year ago, and his place has not been filled. Now there is here a native christian pundit, who has felt for some time a desire to preach and who well is fitted to do it. He is a thorough christian, the son of a christian minister. For the last two months he has gone with me regularly every night to the bazaar, and preached to the heathen. I would like very much to have him give up teaching and do christian work altogether, which, I am sure he would do if his salary were sufficient to provide for his family. For the first year 15 rupees or about \$6 a month would be plenty, and increased to 20 rupees according to his efficiency. Besides his teaching, which he does from 6 to 11 o'clock in the morning, he studies the Bible 2 hours and the Hindu sacred books one hour a day and preaches from 40 to 60 minutes in the bazaar.

This man, Daniel Naik, (pronounced Nake) I would like to see adopted by some New Brunswick Board at a salary of about \$75 a year.

I am greatly encouraged with the work here. There is a good deal of interest being created among the native Christians and not a little among the Hindus themselves. We are here for success, and by the master's help we expect to see it.

The heat for the last few weeks has been most intense. It is very enervating and sometimes seems almost unendurable.

Miss Ida Phillips left Balasore on Monday last. She will spend a month with her friends at Midnapore and then sail for America. Having been here ten years she goes home to rest.

On Sunday evening last the native christians held a very ceremonious farwell meeting in her honor. She will sail on the first of July for Liverpool.
