

News of the Week.

NEW BRUNSWICK.

Connors' big drive is clear of Lake Temiscouata, and a portion of it, probably 2,000,000 feet, has already gone over Grand Falls. A large force of men are employed on the drive, and are located now along the Madawaska and Upper St. John. The whole drive is kept moving, and there seems to be little doubt but that every stick will be got down. There is about 14,000,000 feet of lumber in the drive.

The Canadian Post Office authorities, says the Estport Sentinel, have directed the postmaster at Welchpool, Campobello, to change the old-time style of writing the name of the island, and make two words of it—Campo Bello.

The will of the late Rev. J. E. Reud has been admitted to probate, and letters testamentary thereof have been granted to Mrs. Reud, Mr. J. A. Vanwart and Mr. E. W. Slipp. The estate is entered at \$1,200. Mr. A. W. Baird proctor for executors.

Special customs officer Wolf has reported to the Customs department the seizure of a lot of watches smuggled into Canada from the States at Salmon River, N. B.

Dr. Lewis M. P. P. for Albert Co. has resigned his seat.

The published statistics of the registration of births, marriages and deaths throughout the province shows that the law is being sadly neglected. For example, in Kings county, which has a population of over 25,000 in 5,000 families, according to the last census, the returns give only five births in the half year from January first. Other returns are as glaringly incorrect. It will be some time before the people become familiar with the law and thoroughly impressed with the importance of compliance with its provisions.—*Courier*.

Michael Taylor's barn at Stanley, with all its contents was destroyed by fire Sunday night. Three tons of hay, a carriage and a calf were burned.

The following post offices were established in New Brunswick on the 1st July: Dunlop, Beresford Parish, Gloucester, Robt. Moody, postmaster; St. Joseph, New Brandon, Gloucester, B. Landry; Lameque, Craquet, Gloucester, C. Chiasson.

Rev. Harry Haines and son (colored), captured three bears on Saturday last, an old one and two cubs. They caught the old one in a trap and shot the cubs, which were up a tree. The male made good his escape, although he was closely cornered.

Wednesday afternoon Yardmaster James Wark of the New Brunswick railway met with a horrible death at McAdam. He was engaged in coupling a car when the link struck him and crushed him to death. Mr. Wark has been yardmaster at McAdam for some years. He leaves a widow and a large family.—*Gleaner*.

Diphtheria of a malignant type has broken out in Grand Falls in a family of the name of Poiras. The local board of health have quarantined the house. It is feared that the disease will spread unless the greatest precautions are taken.

The contract entered into between the gas company of Moncton and town council for street lighting expires. At a meeting, the other day, of the members of the council, it was decided to improve the efficiency of the street lighting service by substituting the electric light for gas. As the electors have a voice in this matter the question will be submitted to them.

A boy named Richard Harrison left his home on Queen street St. John, Monday afternoon for the purpose of having an outing in the woods near Bedford. He took with him enough food to last a day. Towards evening he lost his way in the woods and decided to camp out for the night. Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday passed without his being able to find his way and having gone without food for three days he commenced to grow weak. On Thursday a man named Sweeney came across the boy, who said he had lain down to die.

NOVA SCOTIA.

Says the Yarmouth Times: We are glad to hear that active work has at last been started at the gold mines of Carleton and Kempth and their prospects look exceedingly well.

Digby was greatly excited when it became known the professional burglars had entered the shops of R. S. Fitzrandolph and E. Burnham during the night of the 23rd. The latter's safe was blown out but it contained no money, and the thieves got nothing. Fitzrandolph lost a number of watches and other valuables. There is no clue to the robbers.

The Nova Scotia Steel company, with headquarters at New Glasgow, are applying for supplementary letters patent increasing their capital stock from \$300,000 to \$1,000,000, and extending their power so as to enable the company to manufacture steel and iron in all their branches, and articles consisting of iron or steel, in whole or part; and changing the name to the Nova Scotia Steel and Forge company (limited).

It is understood a Nova Scotia syndicate has intimated its intention of applying to the federal government for a lease of Sable Island. The scheme includes horse breeding on an extensive scale, there being a large number of horses in a semi-wild state on the island.

Haying has commenced in this vicinity. Already several of our farmers have large areas of grass mown. The crop, concerning which grave doubts were entertained during the early part of the summer, has been greatly benefited by the subsequent rains, and the indication is now that a good average crop will be harvested. It is estimated that nearly a third larger crop will be gathered from the dykes this year than last.—*Digby Advertiser*.

The marine department has awarded fifty dollars to the owner, a binocular glass to the captain, a watch to the mate and fifteen dollars to each of the crew of the bark Wolf of Pictou, for saving the crew of the brig W. C. Warner.

Mr. Morrison, the nominee of the opposition in Colchester, has withdrawn. The Third Party has nominated Mr. Fulton.

The historic lumber raft at the Joggins was launched on Tuesday of last week. Everything was satisfactory and in less than a minute from the start it was afloat.

The raft or ship is 592 feet in length, 54 feet beam and 36 feet in depth in the middle, containing 21,300 pieces of piling, which average six inches in the middle and contain about 20 cubic feet each. The raft weighs 10,650 tons carpenter's measure, drawing about 20 feet of water, and is held together by a cable through the centre from stem to stern and cross-lacings secured to the cable which also is the towing chain, and the whole raft is lashed together with 58 bands of steel wire rope passed around three times and fastened. The chains used in her construction weigh 41 tons, and the wire rope measures over four miles. The anchor weighs 4,500 pounds, and the towing cable is of one and three-quarter inch iron.

The lobster fishery for the season on the Eastern coast of Cape Breton closed on Saturday last. Owing to blustery weather and scarcity of bait the catch is much below previous years. The lobsters, with the exception of one section of the coast, were found large, plentiful and in excellent condition.

In the case of the colored man, Morse charged with incest, which was to have come before Stipendiary Arthur, of Amherst, for examination, as the complainant did not put in appearance, the prisoner was released. It is said he will proceed against the complainant.

OTHER PROVINCES.

The Victoria, B. C., *Times* says that reports about the Skeena river troubles have been exaggerated.

The Icelandic families in the Northwest subscribed \$5,000 from their last year's earnings, which is sufficient to bring out 160 of their relatives.

A rich discovery of gold has been made at the Lake Superior iron company's shaft near Ishpeming. Three hundred pounds of quartz carrying free gold at the rate of over \$60,000 to the ton was uncovered by one blast.

Two freight trains collided on the Grand Trunk near Quebec Thursday morning, resulting in the complete smashing of both engines and considerable damage to rolling stock.

Potato bugs are doing great damage in the vicinity of Quebec city.

Fire destroyed the Beaverton, Ont., foundry; loss about \$20,000; no insurance.

Four children of a man named Vanderville were drowned on Tuesday evening at L'Assomption, Que.

A most disastrous fire occurred at Mildmay, Ont., destroying the large roller mill, saw mill and private residence of Eidt & Schmid. In the roller mill were 2,000 bushels of wheat, and a large quantity of flour. A very large quantity of lumber was also destroyed. The loss is estimated at \$20,000; insurance \$5,000.

A man named Joseph Racette, of Longueuil, was out working in the fields Saturday until after dark, and on his way home with some companions he drank two bottles of whiskey. Next morning he was found dead in bed.

A terrific storm passed over Alliston, Ont., Sunday night, unroofing several houses and barns, levelling trees and straw stacks and doing other damage.

The lumber cut in Ottawa district during the present season will be much heavier than for the past 10 years, increasing over 40 per cent, as comparison with last year. Careful comparison places this year's production at 500,000,000 feet, nine-tenths of which has been sold to United States dealers.

UNITED STATES.

The Poles of Chicago and all the large cities of the United States have joined in a petition to Pope Leo asking him to order the Polish clergy in this country to remove the religious ban from the Polish National Alliance. The petition, to which are attached about 10,000 signatures, was forwarded to Rome yesterday and has created a great sensation in Polish quarters. The Polish National Alliance is a benevolent as well as a political organization.

The coal mining town of Roslyn, W. T. was burned on Tuesday. The entire population of 1,500 is homeless. Nothing was saved. About 250 houses were burned. No office is left but the coal company's office and depot. The loss is \$500,000. No insurance.

California's production of dried fruit has increased from 5,070,000 pounds in 1887 to 26,605,000 pounds in 1888.

The fastest trains in the United States are on the Baltimore and Ohio road. There are two of these which make the run of forty miles between Baltimore and Ohio in forty five minutes, a speed of fifty-three and three tenths miles an hour.

Despatches from San Francisco, report that the arctic whaling fleet up to June 16th, and the Japan sea fleet up to June 30th, had taken only five whales each.

Word from St. Paul says that Standing Rock and Great Spread say the ultimatum of the Indians was given to the commissioners on the 29th. The Indians were in council all Thursday night, and after many speeches every Indian gave assent to the proposition not to sign the treaty.

BRITISH AND FOREIGN.

Semi-official advices from St. Petersburg state there has been no political exchange of views between the Czar and Emperor William. The sole significance of imperial meeting rest upon the cordial personal friendship which the interviews cemented.

Mr. and Mrs. Gladstone celebrated their golden wedding Wednesday. Testimonials were received by the hundreds.

Disastrous fires in the timber regions of northern Sweden destroyed the town of Lundesvall and two neighboring villages. The loss is estimated at \$9,000,000.

A despatch from Wady Halfa says three boats loaded with native fugitives who left that place during the attack of Dervishes, on the 20th inst., sunk in the river and 150 persons were drowned.

Gladstone, replying to a congratulatory address from Edinburgh, which contained reference to his wife, said it would be difficult to give an adequate idea of the domestic happiness of his married life.

In regard to the allusions to himself he felt they were too flattering. His conduct had been often criticized, sometimes perhaps unjustly, but he thought on the whole the criticizing had been more to his benefit than the reverse.

When evictions were resumed on the Vandeleur estate, in the county Clare, all the tenants offered a stout resistance, blocking doors with beams and boulders. A force of police and soldiers protected the bailiffs, who used battering rams, advancing to the attack under showers of boiling dirty water and stones. Fights occurred in many cases after the bailiffs effected an entrance. Several persons were wounded on both sides. Most of the male tenants and several of the neighbors who assisted them were arrested. An unsuccessful attempt was made to arrange a compromise regarding the threatened eviction of other tenants.

Already 62 amendments have been proposed to the Parnell commission bill. Parnell will move first his amendment to inquire into the Times' letters, and Sexton will move to limit the inquiry to persons named in the schedule of the bill.

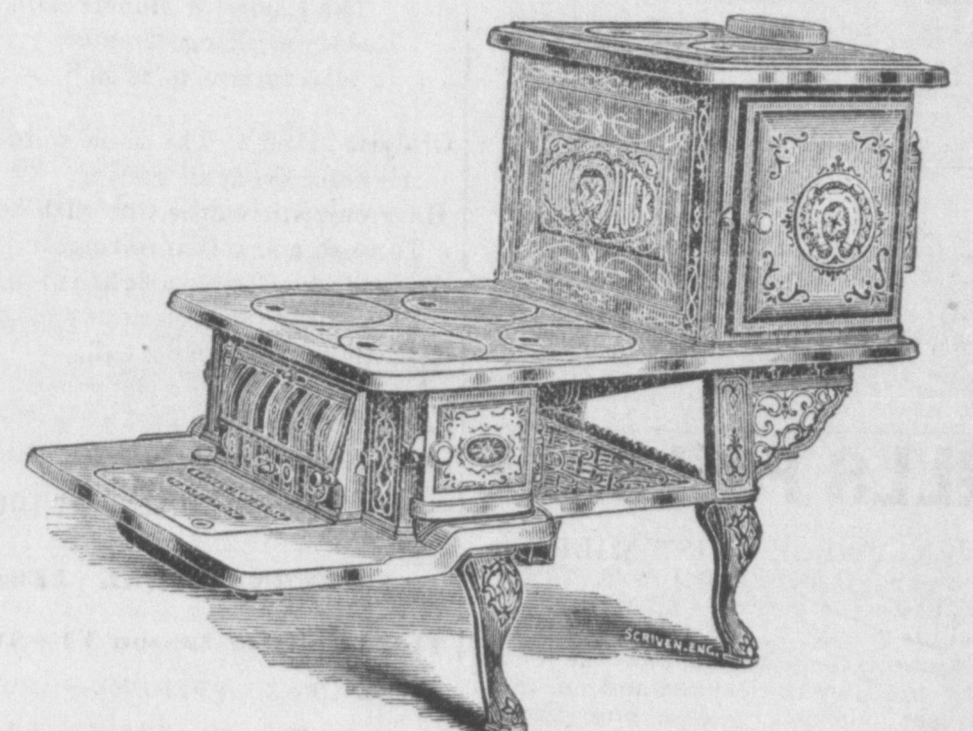
