FROM REV. A. C. THOMPSON.—The denominational news department of our paper has been especially encouraging of late; we rejoice in the abundant success of Brethren Nobles, Clark, Swim and others in the harvest field; others of us must be content to continue our seed sowing, and wait the harvest tide, trusting God to send the promised increase in his own time and way.

I am glad to be able to say that in this section we are holding the fort; yes, and more too. Corn Hill is on the steady upgrade. Our last Conference Meeting there was one of the best we have had for three years; and the prayer meetings are now well sustained. Petitioning, in its prayer and conference meetings, is doing exceedingly well; some of them being real feasts to the soul; they often give needed inspiration to the sometimes discouraged pastor. Graves Settlement is barely holding on its way, but we are hopeful of better days, and shall continue praying, working, and trusting God.

This year, as last, I have the care of the churches at Five Points and Wheaton Settlement, though I did not engage with either of them till Jan. of this year. As I did not wish to deprive any of the churches of that pastoral care, I left the fields open for them to engage a man, if one could be found, upon whom they could all agree; that not being done, I acceded to the request of the Five Points and Wheaton Settlement Churches. Wheaton Settlement is in some respects a discouraging field for Christian work, both church and congregation being so small; but on the other hand there are some things that especially cheer and gladden a pastor's heart; a thoughtful, generous care for their minister's temporal needs, a denominational loyalty, a stick-by-their-minister spirit being most pronounced.

We attempted to hold a series of meetings with the Five Points Church, but the bad roads and my two weeks illness, coupled, perhaps, with too weak faith, formed a combination strong enough to prevent us seeing as much of the blessing of God as we had hoped and desired. Still good has been done, and the church has been considerably helped and some salvation seen; we expect baptism there the 31st inst.

Portage Church is not having any regular pastoral care this year, though we expect to extend some care to them during the summer. Lower Ridge, Steves Settlement, Lewis Mountain and Eagle Settlement Churches are without pastors.

But I must not forget to speak of the epidemic that has broken out upon my field; I am almost tempted to say that I should be pleased to hear of its extension to other fields, that others of my brethren's hearts may be made glad. I refer to the donation-social mania, the donations being supplementary to the pledged salary. It appeared first in Wheaton Settlement (as previously noted in this paper), next Corn Hill was attacked, and we were made \$21.10 richer. No doubt this amount would have been much larger but that a few days previously our people there had very generously contributed to one for the Methodist minister who preaches fortnightly in

our Corn Hill Church; (and justly too) for his sterling qualities. Five days later it appeared in the Graves Settlement Church, and our pocket-book was still further replenished. And now the church at the Five Points has many of its pronounced symptoms. I have become so accustomed to it now that its extension throughout the entire field would not unnerve me. As my duties in caring for the religious welfare of the people, prevented me from attending any of them, I now through the INTELLIGENCER, which nearly all of them take, publicly thank them. I enclose you two obituary notices. Death has been very busy in this section, and a number of our people have entered into rest. The admonition of the word to us all is "To labour to enter into that rest;" by and by may an abundant entrance be ministered to each of us.

I think I rightly interpret the marching orders God has given to us "Go Forward." God grant that we may fear the Lord's side is the right side, the safe side, the sure side, and those who are there and remain there will be sure to come out conquerors through Him who has loved them. With regard to myself I will say very little, only this; sometimes I feel as though I had just begun instead of being weary.
