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The territory in Central Africa, which has for twenty years been the almost exclusive field of work of Scotch missionaries, is about to be flooded with emissaries of Catholicism. Portugal has evidently become alive to the mistake in letting Protestant England have her own way, and has called in the help of the Church. A most imposing function was held in Algiers the other day, when, in the presence of over a hundred ecclesiastics and amid a crowd of the laity, with gorgeous processions and magnificent music (in which the Portuguese National Hymn was prominent), six missionaries were consecrated for Nyassaland. During the generations that Portugal has held the town of Zambezi, she has never sought to send a missionary north of the river, and only does it now in order to counteract the powerful influence which has been established by British missionaries and British traders. Cardinal Lavigerie, who performed the act of consecration, referred to the splendid work of those devout sons of the Church, Lieutenant Cardozo and Pinto, who have just returned from making what they are pleased to call treaties with the native chiefs. Portugal is evidently determined to make a desperate struggle to retain the belt across Africa she claims as hers.
