

News of the Week.

NEW BRUNSWICK.

Mr. Richard Mitton, of Turtle Creek, A. Co., lost his house and barn by fire Tuesday. The fire is supposed to have been caused by a defective flue. The loss, about \$1,000, is understood to be covered by insurance.

Thos. Dohoney, an elderly man, residing at Rosebank, near Chatham, was fatally stabbed Tuesday by a young man named Keoghan. A deep gash was cut in his throat another at the back of his neck. A row about a dog was the cause of the quarrel.

In the re-organization of the Fisheries inspection service this province will be divided into three districts: No. 1, the county of Charlotte, including Campbell and Grand Manan; No. 2, Restigouche, Gloucester, Northumberland, Kent and Westmorland; No. 3, the remaining counties.

The anti-Scott Act campaign officially begun by vote of the Municipal Council, last January, appears to have been nipped in the bud, like buckwheat at an early frost, by the agitation which has been promoted by the W. C. T. U. The ladies have scared the Councilors into inaction, and the petitions are nowhere. If they could only snuff out the traffic as effectually as they have snuffed out the movement for repeal, they would not labor in vain.—*World*.

The family of the late Judson Hoyt of Prince William claimed the body found in Weaver Brook; Keswick, last week as their long lost son and brother. The features were unrecognizable but one foot was covered with a sock, the other was left on the bench where the young man took the cruel river last fall.

Mr. John Muzerall an old and respected resident of Muzerall Settlement, had been complaining for a short time of a pain in his head and on Sunday last went violently insane. He was with difficulty taken to the asylum on Monday in charge of his brother and Constable Boone.

On Friday the Dominion Express company at St. John received via the C. P. R. a package of goods from Honolulu, addressed to a gentleman in St. Andrews.

Mrs. Robinson, mother of Mr. Thos. Robinson, manager of the Farley mills at Blackville, and cousin of Mr. Alex. Gibson, died at St. Mary's Saturday, at a ripe old age.

The Surveyors of the proposed Short Line Railway are still busy at this end of the road. The local division, composed of sixteen hands, is in charge of Mr. Houghton, C. E. The surveys have been pushed from near Berry's Mills to Canaan River; and the surveyors who are working at the Harvey end of the route, when about midway between here and Fredericton—a point some 45 miles distant—will be met by them. While it looks at present as if the entrance into Moncton would be made by junction with the I. C. R. northern division near Berry's Mills, it is understood that another effort will be made to find a practical entrance to the St. John branch of the I. C. R. at Salisbury. The engineers have failed, so far, to find an easily constructed route into Salisbury.—*Times*.

His honor the lieutenant governor has been pleased to constitute a local board of health for the health district of the county of York, No. 2, under "The Public Health Act, 1887," chapter 3 of 50 Victoria, and to appoint—David R. Moore, M. D., M. P. P. Stanley; John G. Owens, M. D. Southamton; Benj. Coburn, M. D. Bright; Beauman Newton Keith, M. D. Harvey; George A. Haggerty, Dumfries; as members of the said board; and that David R. Moore, M. D., be chairman of the board.

The first sod of the proposed Woodstock and Centreville railway was turned in the presence of some hundreds of persons on Monday last, about two miles below Centreville.

St. John's Carnival last week seems to have been a success. The weather was fine, and there was a very large number of visitors in the city.

On the first of July, new post offices were established at South Newbridge and Tapley's Mills, Carleton county. Wm. Tompkins is postmaster of the former and M. Murry of the latter. The name of the postoffice at Oak Point, Northumberland county, has been changed to Willows.

NOVA SCOTIA.

A Halifax despatch says: A sensation has been caused by the arrest of Otto S. Weeks, M. P. P., on a warrant sworn out by a woman named Annie H. Killan, who charges him with shooting her with intent to kill. The affair is alleged to have occurred on July 2. The woman's injuries were very slight. Mr. Weeks was liberated on \$4000 bail, furnished by C. B. McDougall and Wm. Patridge.

A railway meeting was held at Shelburne Wednesday, addressed by Premier Fielding, Messrs. Mills and Freeman, M. P.s, and others. A resolution was passed demanding federal and local subsidies for the midland route connecting Windsor with Queens and Shelburne counties.

Work is being rapidly pushed on the Annapolis, N. S., water works system. The Nova Scotia Telephone company has connected Halifax with Lunenburg and Bridgewater.

The Bridgetown, N. S., Monitor reports an abundant crop of hay well housed in that section.

The only veteran of the war of 1812 living in Nova Scotia is H. McDonald of Malignant Cove.

The yield of gold in Nova Scotia for June was 1,590 ounces from 2,409 tons of quartz, valued at \$28,786.

Not less than \$7,000 to \$8,000 worth of salmon and alewives, chiefly the latter, were caught on the Gaspeaux, Kings, N. S., this season, and this is the result of opening the dam some few years ago with the Rogers' patient fishway.

Harvey Hills, of Lower Stewiacke, N. S., has a pair of tame partridges, which hatched a brood of eight young birds on July 1st. This is believed to be the first instance in Nova Scotia where these birds have been successfully tamed, or where they have hatched a brood while in captivity.

For the purpose of fisheries inspection Nova Scotia will also be divided into three districts as follows: No. 1, the island of Cape Breton; No. 2, the counties of Halifax, Hants and counties on the mainland eastward; No. 3, counties of Lunenburg, Kings and counties westward.

The crowning event of the season at Hampton, near Bridgewater, N. S., was the marriage of an esteemed and elderly colored citizen Wm. Simms, of 70 years, to Jennie Clements, a dashing brunette of 16.

Says the Londonderry Arc-Light: "The Londonderry Iron Company will pay the I. C. R. this year for freight carriage \$100,000. For wages they will pay out \$252,000. In all \$352,000. They will receive from the government as bonus \$30,000, leaving the handsome balance of \$322,000 in favor of the country."

Acadia Mines, N. S., has a genuine living curiosity, in the person of Earl Gillis, the five year old son of John B. Gillis. This lad weighs 135 pounds, height 4 feet 2 1/2 inches, and girls around the breast 34 inches, and at the waist 42 inches.

A bad fire occurred at Granville Ferry, Friday night. It broke out in a mill owned by Carribean & Co., which was totally consumed, together with a vessel of about 300 tons which was being built alongside and was nearly completed, a blacksmith shop owned by A. D. Messenger, and a carriage shop occupied by Wallace Bohaker. The workmen lost their tools also. The loss is about \$12,000. There is no insurance on the buildings, but the vessel was insured for \$6,000.

A large shed, 300 feet long, used for storing coke for the Londonderry blast furnace, was burned Saturday in Halifax. The whole works of the company had an exceedingly narrow escape from destruction, as 3,000 tons of coke caught fire and the works were only saved by the exertions of a small army of workmen. The loss is about \$6,000.

The saw mill and store of W. P. Cameron at Maitland, Hants were burned Sunday; loss \$7,000, no insurance.

The railway men's Christian convention is to be held in Halifax August 24-26.

OTHER PROVINCES.

The recent splendid rains have wonderfully improved the crop prospects in Manitoba. Farmers who three weeks ago expected only half a crop of wheat are now confident of reaping one about average.

Since April last over fifty letters have been abstracted from a branch office in Montreal, and on Tuesday a carrier named Joseph St. Jean was caught in the act of putting a letter in his pocket.

The English system of apportioning stationery to the departments has been adopted by the government at Ottawa. Hon. Mr. Chapleau has been for some time engaged in introducing the system, which is based on an experience of 20 years. The change will result in saving expenditure and increased efficiency.

Square timber is bringing good prices in Quebec, 35,000 feet of waney pine, 31 inches average; and 10,000 square white pine 46 feet average, sold at equal to 41 cents all round. Such figures have never previously been paid for Ottawa rafts.

Detective Grosse, of the Canadian secret service agency, is at present engaged in the Mulcahy case. The latest clue seems to lead in the direction of a girl employed at one time in a down town bar room and an ex-army officer. A large number of persons, however, are becoming sceptical about the whole transaction, and are beginning to suspect that there was not even a mock marriage in a sleigh last winter.

At St. Hubert, last week on the farm of Brossard, a workman was driving a mowing machine when he fell from the seat and the shears cut off his right arm, severed the fingers of the left hand, and ripped down his left leg as well as cutting off the toes. The victim is in a critical condition.

A sensation has been created at Kingston, Ont., by the arrest of a son of Marshall H. Switchell, U. S. consul, on a charge of being the masked burglar who entered Mrs. Martin's residence, and it is said he has confessed. Switchell is but a mere boy and up to the present has borne an unblemished character. He is thought to be insane.

Some time ago some vandals set fire to the gas well at Ruthven, Ont., which has a flow of 10,000,000 feet per day, and up to last week nobody has been able to obtain within 200 feet of the well. Friday C. H. Marvin clothed himself in asbestos and performed such work at the mouth of the well as will enable the owners to extinguish the fire. He received \$1,000 for the job.

UNITED STATES.

The bodies of three men, one colored, were found at Whiting Station Indiana, each having a fatal wound on the back of the head. It is thought they were stockmen, passing through with a load of stock, who were murdered and thrown from the train by tramps.

The cotton outlook was never better, indications pointing to a yield of 27,000,000 bales, 500,000 in excess of 1882, the biggest crop ever raised.

On Wednesday night in Elk town ship, Wesley Elkins, only a little more than 11 years of age, murdered his father and his step-mother. After committing the crimes he took his infant sister in a carriage and drove four miles to the nearest neighbor reporting that he had discovered his parents murdered and fled to save his own and his sister's life. Yesterday he confessed he was the murderer. He had some difficulty with his father and shot him while he slept. His mother, he despatched with a club.

BRITISH AND FOREIGN.

The trial of strikers at Breslau Prussia, has resulted in the conviction of 32 of the prisoners. The ringleader was sentenced to seven years of penal servitude and to be deprived of civil rights for seven years. Nine of the strikers were sentenced to terms of imprisonment ranging from eight months to five years at hard labor, and 22 were sentenced to imprisonment from one year to four years without hard labor.

Thursday was the golden wedding day of Mr. and Mrs. Gladstone. The Queen telegraphed congratulations, and the Prince and Princess of Wales and other members of the royal family sent letters to them. The Prince of Wales sent a gold inkstand to Mr. Gladstone. A number of Liberal ladies presented a portrait of Mr. Gladstone with his grandson, painted by Millais. A large number of other presents were received. Mr. Gladstone rose and attended the morning services. An immense number called during the day.

The steamer Belgic arrived from Hong Kong and Yokohama, says the recent fire at Luchow burned 23 hours, destroyed 87,000 dwellings. Over 1,200 perished in the flames and 400 others were killed. Nearly 17,000 people are obliged to camp out without shelter and are dying at the rate of 100 a day from want and exposure.

Denmark's foreign egg trade has grown to a tremendous size, mainly with England. Twenty years ago the annual Danish export of eggs was 900,000, now it is reckoned at 11,000,000.

The British House of Commons by a vote of 230 to 76 agreed to grant a lump sum of £600,000, or, as an alternative, £20,000 pounds annually, to build railways in Ireland.

Two-thirds of the total number of the English cotton spinners have agreed to limit the production to one-half the usual amount for one month.

Boulanger will be a candidate in 92 cantons for councils-general.

The wedding presents received by the Princess Louise of Wales displayed at Marlborough house are of the total value of £150,000. The jewels alone are valued at £120,000.

On Saturday Her Royal Highness Princess Louise Victoria Alexandra Damar, eldest daughter of the Prince of Wales, was married to Alexander William George, Earl of Fife, Knight of the Thistle. The ceremony took place in the private chapel of Buckingham palace.
