

## PARLIAMENT.

The house had an exciting debate over Sir John's resolution providing for the construction of a railway between a point of junction on the New Brunswick railway at or near Harvey, N. B. and a point of junction with the Intercolonial railway at or near Salisbury, N. B.

The motion was carried. When the house went into committee of ways and means, Mr. Mulock asked what action the government proposed to take on the application of Ontario millers for an increase in duty on flour.

The speaker ruled the question out of order. A great portion of the morning was spent discussing land grants in Manitoba and the Northwest to railway corporations. It was brought out that some forty million acres in all have been granted since the opening up of that country.

The order paper was cleared off and the house devoted itself to the questions and answers.

Sir John intimated that next year parliament would meet early in January.

One hundred and ten bills were passed this session—forty-five government, two public, thirty-eight railway, four loan, five insurance, three church, one college, ten bridge, four divorce, and several general. Ninety-six addresses and orders were issued and sixty-seven returns brought down.

In the Senate the Harvey-Salisbury Short Line Bill was, much to the surprise of everybody, thrown out, a motion to consider it six months hence, being carried by 22 to 11.

On Thursday Parliament was prorogued. The closing hours were devoid of interest.

Sir John was not in his seat, but Sir Hector in reply said the cabinet would consider the matter of the Short Line, in the view of the Senate action, during the recess.

## News of the Week.

## NEW BRUNSWICK.

On Thursday fire destroyed Green's Tannery at Upper Woodstock. Loss about \$1000. Partially insured.

The value of goods entered for consumption at the port of Fredericton during the month of April this year amounted to \$57,501, and the duty paid thereon to \$4,766.40 as against \$31,029 value and \$4,263 duty for the corresponding month of last year.

Shipments of potatoes and oats by sailing vessels are quite lively at Shediac.

It is difficult to surmise just what St. John thieves will steal next. Recently somebody stole some of the outside windows from Judge Palmer's residence.

The police magistrate of this city has paid to the city treasurer \$222, the amount of the receipts for the month of April. Of this \$150 was collected in Scott Act fines.

James Roberts has been appointed city marshal in the room of Mr. N. T. Wheeler, who has gone to Nebraska. All the other civic officials, were re-appointed.

The New Brunswick Red Granite company has recently shipped from St. George about 250 tons of red granite to New York. The granite will be used in the art museum in Central Park.

On Thursday Jas. Gillis of Harvey, had his arm broken while working on a Maguadavic drive. He was helping to start a jam and was struck in the face with his own pike-pole.

Six men were drowned in St. Andrews Bay on Saturday. The despatch says: Henry McAleeman and his son John, Isaiah Flynn, married and Clementson Flynn, his nephew, Henry Burns and Thos. Anderson left St. Andrews in a sloop at two p. m. Saturday, bound for their homes at Digdegash with thirteen bags of meal, two barrels of flour and other sundries. About three p. m. Angus Holt of Bonaventure saw the sloop while off the north-eastern end of Hardwood island in St. Andrews bay, suddenly career over and sink beneath the water. Holt jumped into his boat and pulled to the rescue, but when he reached the place about a mile from where he started found only a barrel of flour, an oar and four hats floating on the water. Holt, so far as known, was the only witness of this sad catastrophe. By this accident two wives are left widows and a number of children fatherless; in fact all the men are bread winners of their respective families.

## NOVA SCOTIA.

At Gay's River N. S. one day last week a farmer named Woodard had a yearling steer destroyed by a bear.

Farms in Cape Breton are fully a month in advance of last spring, while there has been no repetition of the great scarcity of fodder than experienced. If the weather keeps showery, there will be an unusually heavy hay crop, and if dry, probably average hay and abundant root crops.

The will of the late John S. MacLean leaves the bulk of his property to his wife and two daughters, with small bequests to other relatives. About \$4,000 is given to charities. The estate is valued at \$150,000.

An explosion took place at the Acadia Powder Company's works, at Waverly early Tuesday morning. Four tons of powder in the drying house blew up, wrecking all the mills and employees' houses, completely overturning one and imprisoning a man and his wife until help came. No one was hurt. Had it occurred in the day time it must have resulted in a serious loss of life.

The sugar refinery within the past few days again advanced prices, which are now in lots of 100 bbls. and upwards, granulated 8½ cts.

A new wing is being added to the Halifax ladies college. There are nearly 300 pupils attending the college.

The old sad story is again repeated. A Gloucester fishing schooner is lost on the banks, and eleven Nova Scotia fishermen go down with the vessel. Most of these men leave widows and large families. The Gloucester fishing craft are often unsea-worthy. The number of Nova Scotians that have perished in them is appalling.

Work on the Yarmouth street railway will be begun shortly. It has been decided to run the cars by electricity, and the line will be in operation this summer.

Wolfville voted Wednesday to adopt the act to authorize the establishment of a water service. The act was carried by 56 majority.

The assessed valuation of property in Dartmouth, N. S. is \$1,526,185. The town rate of taxation is \$1.08 per \$100; the school rate 39 cents per \$100.

James Wilson, a blacksmith at Windsor, returned from the United States after two years' absence, visited the house where his wife lived, threw her on the floor, cut off the top of both her ears close to her head, and kicked and otherwise brutally ill-treated her. He was arrested.

The municipal council of Inverness has voted a \$100,000 bonus towards the construction of the Richmond and Inverness railway.

The body of a woman named Mrs. Elizabeth Prudence was found floating in the dock Liverpool, N. S. Thursday. She had been seen intoxicated the night before.

The date for the summer carnival week at Halifax has been fixed for August 5th to 10th.

A house near Kingsport was struck by lightning and badly demolished. The occupant, Mrs. Barron, had her stockings burned from her feet by the bolt, but was uninjured beyond a bad shock.

The fishing schooner Oxley arrived in Halifax Thursday from Grand Banks. Captain Morton reports on Sunday night, while lying to on the Banks, his schooner was run into by what he thought was a Norwegian barque. The bowsprit of the schooner was carried away and one of her boats smashed.

A few days ago the vestry of St. Mary's Catholic cathedral, Halifax, was entered by some unknown person, who forced the door open and stole a silver watch, the property of the sexton. During holy week an iron box in the basement was broken open with an axe and \$850 taken.

## OTHER PROVINCES.

The Newfoundland seal catch this year is reported to have been something unprecedented. Within the short period of six weeks seals have been taken to the value of \$1,000,000.

A number of delegates from Belgium are negotiating to establish a small colony of Belgian emigrants, with a collective capital of \$600,000 in Gaspe. They are fishermen.

The bank doing the smallest business in the Dominion is the Farmers' Bank of Rustico, P. E. I. The total amount of its liabilities is \$19,806, and its resources amount to \$8,211, and it declares a yearly dividend of 6 per cent.

Four men were drowned at Midland, Ont., by the upsetting of a sail boat.

## UNITED STATES.

The fact that New York city has borrowed \$9,000,000 at two and a half per cent. is attracting general attention. The loan is to run forty years, and the money is exempt from taxation. No city or nation in history, so far as known, ever placed a loan as low as that before.

Five broke out in the coal mines at Ashland, Minn. The loss will be very large. Four hundred men are thrown out of work.

Mrs. J. M. Kellogg, wife of the attorney General of Missouri, has been installed as first assistant attorney general yesterday. She was admitted to practice in the supreme court eight years ago and is a member of the state bar association. For several years she was a partner in the law business of her husband.

New York was chiefly occupied last week in celebrating the centennial of Washington's inauguration as first President of the Country.

Thursday a fearful storm visited the town of Warsaw N. C. Hail accompanied the wind and fell to the depth of eight inches in 30 seconds. The Presbyterian church was demolished, a number of houses and many barns destroyed and not one whole chimney left in the town. The strawberry crops were destroyed. Several people were injured by flying timbers.

At Blair, La., Thursday, a merchant named Melwick shot his wife and two children, set fire to his residence, burned the bodies of his victims and then shot himself dead.

## BRITISH AND FOREIGN.

General Boulanger has summoned a council of his supporters to meet in London, May 16.

By an explosion in Recklinghausen colliery Germany, three persons were killed and eight injured.

The Cronstadt police have discovered stores of explosives to be used in an attempt upon the life of the czar.

In the house of commons Wednesday a motion of Samuel Smith, liberal, censuring the government for fostering a spirit of drinking in India, was carried 113 to 103.
