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

A Remarkable Clock,

The most remarable clook in America if we consider the place in which it was built, is the one which was made by a manner in the Hallenbeck colliery at Wilkesbarre, Pa. This clock was made out of bits of wood and iron, and with the roughest tools that can be imagined. It was made nearly half a mile under ground, and it occupied the maker nearly nine years before he could say it was done. The clock is nine feet high, and there are sixty-three figures which move by two moving figures in the Strassbury 1888 UNIVERSITY 1888 clock. On the front of the Wilkesbarre clock—the one we are speaking of—there are three shelves or balconies. Along the lower balcony, a mounted general leads a file of Continental soldiers. The liberty bell rings, and the sentinel salutes the procession. 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
