N. S. HOME MISSION REPORT.—It is now over two months since I came to Kings County, representing the Home Mission Board, to engage in the work of the Lord.

I first visited Hall's Harbor, where I received a very hearty welcome. The cause of the Lord was very low. Many were almost discouraged, some were doubting and others careless, but there were those who were not only desirous of seeing better days but were praying and working to that end. Soon after my arrival I commenced special meetings. On account of storms, bad roads, and other hindrances, the work was slow at first, but God has wonderfully blessed the church and people. Many say that the cause of the Lord has not been in as good and healthy state as now for many years. Many who had wandered from the Lord have come back in Christian work, unconvinced ones have been brought back to Christ, twenty-eight have been baptized, and these with three others united with the church, in all thirty-one; and all of God's people were strengthened, and encouraged. Others made a start, and I hope will attend to the duties and commands of the gospel. At the close of the special meetings, the church and congregation made me a generous cash donation together with collections amounting to \$75.10.

Not having entirely recovered from the effects of "La Grippe" when I came to this county I was glad to have Bro. Z. West meet me at Kentville and take me to his home in Hall's Harbor, and to him and his wife I tender my sincere thanks for their kindness. As I visited in the many homes at the Harbor and throughout the place in the name of our Lord and Master, I found their homes not only open to me but they seemed to appreciate my calls. I feel very thankful to all the kind friends, the names of whom are too numerous to mention, for their many tokens of friendship.

I have visited Black Rock and Chipman Brook, preaching once in each place. Opportunity did not open for me to remain longer there. The cause of the Lord in the Black Rock church is not as strong as a few years ago. It has been weakened by death and removals. I received \$1.49 for H. Missions at Chipman Brook.

The brethren very kindly conveyed me to my appointments.

I am now at Canning, and of the interest here I can let you know in the future.

REVOKED.—The last Royal Gazette has the following:

The Lieutenant Governor has ordered that the appointments of Hugh Miller, as Vendor of Liquors under the Canada Temperance Act, for the Parish of Aberdeen, in the County of Carleton, and of John Barnett, as Vendor of Liquors under the Canada Temperance Act for the Parish of Brighton, in the County of Carleton, be revoked, and their licenses cancelled.

Both these men were accused of freely and indiscriminately selling liquor. The Government has evidently been satisfied that the accusations are well founded, hence the dismissals.

WESTERN TERRITORIES is the name which what we call the Northwest is henceforth to be known. The change of name is an improvement.

THE TEMPERANCE SOCIETIES of Moncton intend having a big temperance demonstration in that city on the Queen's birthday.

THE SIXTH INTERNATIONAL Sunday School Convention is to be held in Pittsburgh, Pa. June 24—27. The programme has been issued and shows an interesting series of meetings and discussions. There are expected about seventeen hundred delegates.

THE SAILORS' HOME, formally opened in St. John last week, is said to be one of the best of its class. To the Christian generosity of one lady—Miss Hutchinson—the city and the sailors who visit the port are indebted for the Home. The opening exercises were interesting. The Governor and others made addresses. The institution will doubtless prove a great blessing to those for whom it is designed.

BE CAREFUL.—Do Christian parents who are farmers, realize the great need of care in hiring men? You hire a man who is to be an inmate of your family and associate day after day with your children for six or more months. Suppose he is a man of corrupt thoughts and words; you would better hire a man with small-pox. He will be almost sure to plant the seeds of evil in the minds of those dearer to you than life. It is best always to be careful—to take a man on trial.

POST OFFICE AND RUM SHOP.—The Post Office at Fredericton Junction is in the same building as a rum shop, and the Post Master is a rum-seller. He is not even a licensed rum-seller, as no licenses are issued in Sunbury Co. He is a persistent violator of the C. T. Act, and yet continues to hold the office of Postmaster. This state of things cannot be satisfactory to the people of the Junction. They certainly cannot enjoy sending their children or going themselves to a rum shop for their mail. To have the P. O. in such a place is an outrage against moral sense, and should not be tolerated. The people owe it to themselves and their children and to decency to take immediate steps to have the office put in another place and in charge of some one who is not a flagrant and notorious violator of law.

We have heard of a similar case in Carleton Co. Let these disgraces be removed at once.

RESIGNED.—Rykert M. P. has resigned his seat in Parliament. The committee on his case had concluded their examination, and were about ready to report. The report as drafted was a strong condemnation of Rykert. This he of course knew, and therefore resigned, declaring that he had not received fair play. The sooner Parliament is rid of all of his kind the better.

HAND IT BACK.—It is stated that Gen. Laurie M. P. has intimated his intention of donating the excess of travelling fees drawn by him, supplemented by an additional amount of his own, to the establishment of a Fisherman's Benefit Association in Shelburne Co.

The Fisherman's Benefit Association is well enough, but it is not well to put into it any of the extensive traveling money. That should be handed back.

The showing of House furnishing goods this season at Edgecombe's carpet rooms is very extensive, embracing all those necessary things housekeepers require at this time of year. Mr. Edgecombe's range of Carpet poles is very fine, and he is selling a nice pole with brass trimmings complete for 25 cents. Just think of it, a few years ago it would have cost you a dollar.
