Second Quarter—Lesson XIII.—June 29

REVIEW.—TEMPERANCE.—MISSIONS.

REVIEW AND MISSIONS.—Isa. 55:8-13.

GOLDEN TEXT.—*Blessed are they which do hunger and thirst after righteousness: for they shall be filled.*—Matt. 5:6.

I. Let the scholars give the titles and Golden Texts, giving them, if necessary, a hint by means of the first letters of the chief words of the titles.

II. THE TIME.—About a year and five months, from midsummer of A. D. 28 to December, A. D. 29.

III. PLACES.—Galilee, Bethsaida, Perea, and the region of Caesarea Philippi.

IV. JESUS.—About 33 years old at the close of the period. This period was one of marked epochs in his life,—great crowds attended him; his first miracle of raising the dead; the new method of teaching by parables.

Subject.—The Principles of the New Kingdom Taught and Lived.

Illustration. "Has Canon Taylor heard Mr. Calvert and Mr. Webb tell the story of Pagan missions? How heathenism has been so swept away that the visitor cannot believe that those people, polite as Parisians and honest as Norwegians, were wild cannibals a generation ago? How, out of less than 112,000 Fijians, over 100,000 are attendants on Christian worship? How, where fifty years ago there was not one Christian, there is to-day not one avowed heathen? How there are over 1200 places of Christian worship, and not one cannibal even or heathen temple? And yet Christian missions are 'a great failure'? Is it not rather the Canon himself?"—Rev. A. T. Pierson.

TEMPERANCE LESSON.—Dan. 1:8-17.

GOLDEN TEXT.—*Wherever shall a young man cleanse his way? by taking heed thereto according to thy word.*—Ps. 119:9.

SUBJECT.—VICTORY OVER TEMPTATION.

The Captives.—King Nebuchadnezzar ordered that from among the captives should be selected a number from the highest families, to be trained in the language and literature of the Chaldeans. The object was that they should be held as hostages. Four were selected, the chief of whom was Daniel. The others were the Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego, who afterwards were cast into the fiery furnace and escaped unharmed.

The Temptation.—8. *Purposed that he would not defile himself with the king's meat: i. e., food.* What was the wrong in eating the king's food? The dietary might comprise articles of food, such as the flesh of swine, hares, etc., which the law interdicted to the Israelites. The flesh may not have been perfectly cleansed from blood. The custom among the heathen of consecrating each meal by offering a portion of it to their idols, and pouring out libations of wine in their honor. The luxurious diet provided by the king would corrupt the body and diminish the vigor of the mind. *Nor with the wine.* He had probably seen its effect on others; the bad company and danger into which it led.

Temptation to what. The four captives were tempted (1) to do that which was debasing and degrading; (2) to disobey the law of God; (3) to yield to the popular idolatry of the day; and (4) thus to be recreant to their country and their nation and all the promises and hopes which belonged to them.

Tempted by what. (1) By appe-

tite. The love of luxuries. (2) By their ambitions. (3) By the king's command. Why should they not yield, their life might depend upon it. (4) By the love of popularity. Their course would make them appear odd, and subject them to ridicule. Put now all these things together, and where in modern life can you find a case of stronger temptation to a self-indulgent and pleasure-seeking career?

Illustration. Have you a Boy to Spare? The saloon must have boys, or it must shut up shop. Can't you furnish it one? It is a great factory, and unless it can get about 2,000,000 from each generation for raw material, some of these factories must close out. "Wanted—2,000,000 boys," is the notice. One family out of every five must contribute a boy to keep up the supply. Will you help? Which of your boys will it be? The Minotaur of Crete had to have a trireme full of fair maidens each year; but the Minotaur of America demands a city full of boys each year. Are you a father? Have you contributed a boy? If not, some other family has had to give more than its share. Are you not selfish, voting to keep the saloon open to grind up boys, and then doing nothing to keep up the supply?

The Victory over Temptation.—Vers. 8-14.

By an Earnest Purpose. "He purposed in his heart."

By using Wise Means. *He requested of the prince of the Eunuuchs, that he might not defile himself:* as noted above. He must have confessed his religious scruples, and the adherence to the God of his fathers. Daniel did not believe in the maxim "when in Rome do as the Romans do," in its application to moral questions.

By the Help of God. *Now God had brought Daniel into favour and tender love.* The favor of others toward the godly is the doing of God.

By His own Character. The "favor and tender love" were the gift of God, doubtless, by influencing Ashpenaz by his Spirit; by producing in Daniel attractiveness of person and manners, and a noble character.

By the Test of Facts. *The king who hath appointed your meat.* It appears that the king's object was to secure in them the very best mental and physical development. *Why should he see your faces worse looking.* Less beautiful, fresh, healthy. His idea was that high living is essential to health and good looks,—a very common mistake. *Give us pulse to eat,* as beans, peas, etc. Grain, vegetables, herbs, opposed to flesh and more delicate food. What Daniel wanted was a vegetable diet, with water instead of wine. *And water to drink.* This, also, was important to show that wine was not necessary to produce healthfulness of appearance, or manly strength and beauty.

(1) Physical results. Temperance made them fairer and fatter (ver. 15).

(2) Moral and intellectual results. Knowledge, skill, wisdom, character (ver. 17).

(3) Great success in life.

(4) A career of usefulness, piety, steadfastness, power over temptation.

THE LEADER OF THE GREATEST ARMY OF THE AGE.

Miss Willard has, in the United States alone, 500,000 enrolled followers, including the members of the W. C. T. U., active and honorary, and the cadets of the Loyal Temperance Legions.

Launching immediately into the subject, the President of the World's Woman's Christian Temperance Union first described the work of disseminating temperance literature.

"The Union Signal, the organ of the World's and the National W. C. T. U.," said Miss Willard, "last week circulated 88,000 copies. It is published by the W. C. T. U. Publishing House, Chicago; has five editors, all women; pays good wages,

above a certain figure, this year has paid seven per cent. interest. This woman's publishing house last year sent out 130,000,000 pages of temperance literature. This temperance publishing house was founded nine years ago and was born in the brain of Mrs. M. B. Carse, a wealthy lady devoted to the cause.

The capital is made up by \$25 shares of stock held exclusively by white ribbon women. Generous men throughout take stock in the names of their wives and sisters. The Union Signal is the literary outgrowth of the Woman's Crusade movement. The Oak and Ivy Leaf

is the Young Women's paper and the Young Crusader, the organ of the cold water army, 200,000 strong, organized in the Loyal Temperance Legions.

Just a word about the W. C. T. U. Temple in Chicago, which is to cost \$1,000,000, and the office rental from it, is expected, will pay for the whole of our national work. The idea was the same Mrs. Carse's invention. It will be located in the heart of the city near the Board of Trade building. The Temple will be fourteen stories high, and will contain a hall which is to be the Westminster Abbey of temperance. It will be embellished with memorial tablets in honor of the great leaders of the temperance reform of all countries. Relics of personally organized movements, portraits and temperance manuscripts of historical value will be garnered there. The income from the building will be divided pro rata among the different state and local organizations according to the proportion of their subscriptions towards the purchase of its site and its erection. It is to be ready, with our flag waving from the top of it, in time for the World's Fair in 1893 and the opening will be celebrated by a meeting of the World's W. C. T. U. delegates in the Chicago Auditorium—a building which cost \$3,000,000 and is a fairly spectacle. I have travelled all over Europe and for delicacy of art I have," remarked Miss Willard, "seen nothing to surpass it."

Just for a moment indulging in a slangy expression, Miss Willard, with a winning smile, said, "I want to crack up Chicago in view of the World's fair, for if sin aboundeth grace doth the more abound."

Quite recently, the Chicago W. C. T. U. held a pagant given by 700 of what is called "our best people" and the entertainment cleared \$9,000 in one night.

Chicago is the official headquarters of the World's and the National W. C. T. U. The Chicago Union has a lodging house for lost, strayed and stolen men—stolen by the devil shop. Last year it sheltered 40,000 homeless men. Near it is a Gospel temperance mission where every day Christianity is preached. There is also a free kindergarten for the poor and a creche for the care of children whose mothers have to work because their husbands are not supporting them.

"The W. C. T. U. has a temperance restaurant in Chicago which pays a rental of between \$2,000 and \$3,000."

Miss Willard at this point, paused to pay a tribute to Mr. P. D. Armour, the pork packer, who gave \$125,000 for a chapel for the poor, and erected 50 model artisan homes, the whole rental of which is an endowment for the chapel, which is really a fine church.

"You hear about our dynamite," said the lady, "so I want the world to know, also, of the \$2,000,000 free library for all classes and a \$1,000,000 free lending library, intended specially for the poor."

In reply to a query as to the boasted success of high license in Chicago, Miss Willard summed up its fruit tersely, as follows:—"A majority of the City Council are saloon-keepers, the Sunday murder is an established institution, the theatres' greatest night is Sunday, but Christian people have surrounded the city with a cordon of missions. Herrick Johnson well said, 'Low license demands your son; high license, your daughter also.'"

"The gilded high license saloons," declared Miss Willard, "have every attraction for an evil heart. They have gambling halls and haunts of infamy next door to them. Nowhere is law more trampled under foot than it is in Chicago for the law is explicit that all saloons shall be closed on Sundays, no liquor to be sold to minors or men under the influence of liquor, and that all gambling houses shall be closed, but Chicago is the paradise of gamblers. 'Mik' McDonald, the most noted gambling house keeper, is conceded to hold the balance of power in Chicago politics."

"The two most noted whiskey firms in Chicago are Hannah & Hogg and Chapin & Gore. I often think when I see their magnificent establishments, glittering with decoration and rainbow-tinted stained glass, that if in this country Christian people would only separate themselves at the ballot box from those who do not put conscience into their ballots what a blessed thing it would be. They are now unequally yoked together like the names of the two whiskey firms. 'Hogg and Gore' would be an excellent firm to conduct a saloon, while Hannah and Chapin ought to be in a better business, and are names which would fittingly adorn a temperance restaurant."

Alluding to the recent Supreme Court decision permitting the sale of sealed packages of liquor in prohibition states, Miss Willard declared that unless Congress, this session, passes one of the several bills now before it forbidding the sale of such packages in the seven prohibition

states, Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont, Iowa, Kansas, North and South Dakota, the old political parties will, this fall, at the annual state elections, be struck as if by a cyclone.

The future of prohibition in the United States was spoken of with prophetic confidence.

"The national prohibition party," said Miss Willard, "will be a nucleus to a new party under a changed name, probably the home protection of reform party, and then will come the great tidal wave movement that within ten years will carry our cause to triumph."

Miss Willard spoke in very high terms of Miss Gordon as the greatest organizer of children into temperance legions on this continent.
