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opening the meeting. The District Secretary, Mrs. T. Alexander, read an interesting report, detailing the work of the local societies. No new societies had been organized, but the old ones are holding on their way. The amount raised is \$79.06. Speeches on Home and Foreign Missions were made by Messrs McLeod, Perry, Bonnell, Graham, Lewis, Henderson and Foster.

The Sabbath was a beautiful day, between two very wet and disagreeable days. The services were as follows: Prayer meeting at 9 a. m.; preaching at 10 a. m., Rev. J. T. Parsons, at 3 p. m., Rev. W. H. Perry, at 7 p. m., Rev. Jos. McLeod; there was also preaching at Frederick Junction in the morning by Bro. McLeod, and in the evening by Bro. Parsons, and at Mill Settlement, Patterson and Blissville, by Bro. Bonnell. It was a good day. In the evening service at Tracey a large number rose for prayer.

Business was resumed at 8 a. m. Monday. Rev. G. W. Foster was elected Chairman. Reports of committees were received and considered. There were interesting and, we think, helpful discussions of such subjects as ministers' salaries, the duty of the churches to Home and Foreign Missions, the Seminary, Sabbath Schools, Temperance in Sabbath Schools, Conference Fund, protracted meetings, etc. The utmost harmony prevailed during the session and much good must, we believe, result from the full and free consideration given to many points of interest to the churches.

Two licentiates were before the meeting. Bro. S. Golding was referred to his church, and the suggestion that the church give him authority to labour as a local preacher. Bro. I. Lewis, licensed by the Tracey church, was referred to his church, with a suggestion that he be relicensed. The business was not hurried, as is sometimes done in District meetings, but was done with care. The session closed at 4 p. m. Monday. The ministers present were Revs. J. T. Parsons, J. G. McKenzie, G. W. Foster, W. H. Perry, J. Henderson and J. McLeod, and Licentiates Bonnell, Golding and Lewis. The people of the community gave cordial welcome and entertainment to all. The next meeting will be held at Patterson Settlement.

FROM REV. A. C. THOMPSON.—It is but right for me to contribute my quota to the Denominational News column.

As to the churches which I am trying to care for, I am glad to be able to say that the outlook for the future is most encouraging. They are evidencing most spiritual life; the conferences are good, the prayer-meetings well sustained, and the Sunday congregations are to me surprisingly large. Next Sabbath morning (D. V.) I expect to say good-bye to the Corn Hill church. It is now nearly three months since I tendered my resignation, and though asked to reconsider it by some of the brethren, the more I thought and prayed over it, the firmer was my conviction that I ought not so to do, and on the 7th inst., I told them I must insist upon the resignation being accepted. During the past seven years, God has in a marked manner graciously blessed that church, people and pastor, and to-day, for spiritual life, financial integrity, and co-operation with their pastor, I do not think they can be excelled in the denomination. I retire from that church, with the kindest of feelings to all its members, and sincerely hope they may go on from strength to strength, and from victory to victory. I expect (D. V.) to spend another year with the Petitediac Coverdale, Graves Settlement, and Portage churches.

A very pleasing event on the 10th inst., is worthy of notice. On that day the ladies Mission Aid Society of the Corn Hill church met in their regular monthly meeting at Bro. John Dunfield's residence, and at the close of a very interesting missionary prayer-meeting, they agreeably surprised Mrs. Thompson with the gift of a costly parlor lamp, accompanied with an appropriate address. As it hangs in our parlor, shedding its brilliant light, the kind donors are gratefully remembered and we hope God will reward them for all their kindness to us during our seven years sojourn with them. Following is the address:

DEAR SISTER THOMPSON: We, the ladies of the Corn Hill auxiliary foreign missionary society, beg leave to tender you our sincere thanks for the zeal and energy which you have ever manifested in our missionary society, and we feel it is but due to you, and pleasing to us, to give to you, so long the president of our society, some tangible expression of our esteem and love, and on behalf of the sisters and friends of the society we present you with this parlor lamp as a slight token of our regard for you.

And remember, this dear sister, that though for a while you may be separated from us, we hope that wherever you may labor in mission work in the future that this lamp may lighten your

pathway and cause you to remember the many enjoyable seasons we have had together in our missionary prayer-meetings, is the humble prayer of your sisters of the Cornhill church.

Petitediac, Sept. 18.

THIRD DISTRICT.—On Wednesday last, 17th inst., the Third District meeting assembled at Lower Canterbury. Rain had been falling all the week and was still falling, yet there was a good attendance at the first meeting, and till the session closed. The Conference, led by Rev. G. Swin, was a pleasant and refreshing meeting. The ministers in attendance were Revs. Messrs. Noble, Downey, McLeod and Swin, and Licentiates Bonnell and Golding.

In the afternoon the reports of the churches were presented. They were given to a committee to summarize, the report of which committee is given below. Following the reading of the reports there were speeches by brethren Downey, Noble, McLeod, Jonah and others. In the evening there was preaching by brother McLeod.

Thursday at 8 a. m. there was an interesting prayer meeting for an hour. At 9 business was resumed. Rev. Jos. Noble was elected Chairman, and Bro. Woodbury Shepherd was appointed Treasurer pro tem. The committee appointed last year to visit Mapleton, reported. The committee on Licentiates recommended that District License be given brother R. W. Carpenter, which was done. The time of holding the District meeting was changed from the third Wednesday to the third Friday in September at 2 p. m. The committee on church reports presented the following:

The committee appointed to summarize the reports of the churches, beg to submit the following:

1. We find that fourteen churches have reported this year, the largest number reported in any one year. Some of the unreported churches have ceased to exist. Removals, schisms, backslidings and death have each contributed to loss of visibility of these churches. All that have any real vitality left have reported. We recommend that Rev. Dr. McLeod be requested to visit each of the non-reported churches, and aid so far as possible in their reactivation. And if any of them shall be found so disabled and depleted in numbers as to be unable to maintain an existence they be stricken from the list; and that he be paid for his services out of the funds of the District Home Mission. We believe four or five churches exist only in name.

2. We are glad to learn that five pastors have laboured in the District this year, all of whom have done most efficient work. We have learned with deep regret, that three of these ministers intend severing their pastoral relations with the churches with which they have laboured so successfully. We hope those churches will as soon as possible secure efficient pastoral oversight.

3. Fifty-five persons have been baptized and added to the churches this year. These additions have been confined to three churches; hence eleven of the fourteen churches have been without additions. We are firm in the conviction that no church should be satisfied without the addition of saved souls each year.

4. We regret that no more money has been raised for Foreign Mission purposes in the country churches of this District, and sincerely hope they will make the most strenuous efforts between this and General Conference to raise the several sums apportioned to them by District Meeting, as the money is over due and greatly needed to enable the Treasurer to make the necessary remittance to India.

5. We fear all possible is not being done by some of the destitute churches to supply themselves with pastoral oversight and would most earnestly recommend them to use every available effort to secure regular ministerial labour.

6. We would recommend that a copy of the amounts apportioned to each church to be raised for Foreign Missions be published in the RELIGIOUS INTELLIGENCER next week, and that they be reminded by a foot note that they are requested to collect and forward the same to the next session of General Conference.

7. We deeply regret that no more of the churches have fully complied with the request of Conference to raise a sum each year equal to twenty five cents per member. This money is needed to enable the Denomination to efficiently carry on its general work. We firmly believe if proper effort were made by the officers of the churches it could easily be collected. Surely most church members must esteem it a privilege to pay the small sum of 25 cents annually into Conference fund.

8. We are informed by the report of the Upper Hainesville church that it is in trouble and difficulty and needs help. We therefore recommend that a committee of three judicious brethren be appointed to visit and assist them in their need.

9. We are assured that much more should be done in the way of Home Mission work. Several of the weaker churches of this District could be greatly aided by a little money to sup-

pliment what they can raise for support of a minister among them. We would most earnestly urge more practical endeavour to secure funds and the judicious disbursement of the same.

10. We are sorry to find no report of any money from any of the churches for educational purposes. We are not to infer from this fact that no money has been paid for that purpose for such is not the fact. Money has been paid by a few individuals in connection with some of the churches, but it not having passed through the hands of the financial officers of the church it has not been reported. We fear however that sufficient interest is not being taken in this important branch of our denominational work, and would recommend more general and liberal contributions for the higher education of our young men who are looking forward to the work of the ministry. Your committee would wish to remind Free Baptists that the Union Baptist Seminary at St. Martins is the only Educational Institution in the Dominion in which we as a denomination have any interest and therefore it should have the preference when any of our young people are to be sent from home to be educated.

11. We regret that the Sunday school work is not more fully reported. Only three reports were sent in. We think there must be some misunderstanding as to the proper mode of reporting to District Meeting. Your committee would recommend that when the next edition of blanks for reporting churches shall be printed that a blank be printed and attached thereto for reporting Sunday Schools so that it may be detached and forwarded by the District Secretary to the Sunday School Secretary immediately after the close of the District Meeting.

WM. DOWNEY, Sec. Com.

The several sections of this report were discussed, its recommendations being strongly emphasized. Rev. Wm. Downey was appointed to preach the next annual sermon. A committee was appointed to report on temperance at the next session. The F. Mission appointment was made the same as last year. Revs. J. McLeod, W. Downey and J. Noble were appointed to visit Upper Hainesville. A hearty vote of thanks was given the people for their kind entertainment of the meeting; and appreciation was expressed of the work done in putting the church building in such excellent condition.

This is the first time the District Meeting has been held at Lower Canterbury, and we think the members and visitors will be glad when the time comes around for the meeting to be held there again. The business was finished at noon Thursday. There was preaching in the afternoon by Bro. Bonnell, and in the evening by Bro. Carpenter. The meetings were good. Bro. Bonnell remained over the Sabbath.

I should have liked to see many more of our young men who have lately started in the ministry. May the Lord open the way that they may walk in it. Brethren remember me at the throne of grace that I may be diligent in my work, fervent in spirit, serving the Lord.
