

News of the Week.

NEW BRUNSWICK.

Wednesday night a sailor, Thos. Carr, going on board his vessel in St. John, fell into the harbour and was drowned.

The Grand Manan cable is to be repaired and a new cable laid from White Head to Ross Island.

Geo. N. Howland, of Southampton, was fined \$40 before Police Magistrate Marsh, for ill treating a bull, the property of Ross A. Woodman.

Fire broke out in the shed adjoining K. Night's bakery, Moncton. The barn and sheds were totally destroyed; the other buildings were only slightly damaged. Insured.

This has been an off year in lime shipments to the States. The strikes of brick layers, stone masons, brick makers and carpenters paralyzed the building business, and contracts that were let had to be abandoned till next year.

Hall's shingle mill, at Nash's creek, Westgouche Co., was burned.

A petition has been filed, against the return of Mr. J. E. Porter, of Victoria. Alex. Straton is the petitioner.

On account of the unfavorable weather the Fredericton exhibition has been postponed to Oct. 15th and 16th.

The Campbello sardine factory began operations last week, under the superintendence of Mr. Alex. McElwee. This is the only sardine factory in Canada.

The exhibition entries number over 2,500. Hundreds have been refused, the space being all taken up.

Dr. McAllister, formerly of this city, is reported to have died in Australia a few days ago.

A bear has been doing injury to cattle in the vicinity of Harvey, York.

The directors of the Fredericton soap company have decided to build their factory in St. Mary's near the end of the bridge.

The Florenceville has resumed her trips to Woodstock.

Samuel Napier, formerly M. P. P., and previous to that an Australian gold miner, is not astray in his conclusions, there is a large sized bonanza on Alexander Gibson's timber lands in the shape of a gold mine. It is alleged that there is an enormous quantity of very rich gold bearing quartz, which is not, in fact, by any means confined to Mr. Gibson's property. Everybody hopes this is true. —Herald.

If the militia department maintains the integrity of the dominion with as much persistency as it insists upon retaining that little strip of land on George street, the country will be safe for all time to come. They offer to give up the little bit of ground, which the city claim, on the condition that it may be retaken anytime it is needed for military purposes, the city to pay 20 cents a year rent and pay all damages sustained by the contractor who was building the fence. Such an offer is ridiculous. The land is no good to the department and never will be; while it mars the uniformity of the street. How would it do for some of the citizens to raise the question as to what right the military department have to land here any way? —Herald.

A sailor, name not given, was drowned in the falls at St. John, Sunday.

A drowning accident occurred Saturday at Douglas boom, by which James Sinclair, of New Maryland, 16 years of age, lost his life. He was out from shore on a catamaran, when he lost his balance and fell off. The current carried the catamaran beyond his reach, and being unable to swim, Sinclair sank, before assistance could reach him.

NOVA SCOTIA.

Fire destroyed T. G. McMullen's steam saw mill at Shubenacadie. The loss is estimated at \$12,000.

A fatal accident occurred at Dalhousie, nine miles from Annapolis, on Monday. Mr. Michael Pogan was shooting the gun missed fire, and in placing it against his person to ascertain the cause, the gun was accidentally discharged, the rebound striking him with much force, causing internal injuries, which shortly afterwards resulted in death.

A man who the police found in the Portland, Me., railroad yard Sunday morning, and who has since died, presumably from blows received before the officers discovered him, has been identified as Robt. Charlton, of Harbordville, N. S., mate of the schooner Herald.

Alex. Harnish of Greywood, near Annapolis, was thrown from his carriage last week and received fatal injuries.

Cornelius Hendbee was drowned while tending his traps near Canoe.

The heavy downpour of rain last week caused serious damage. The John Bent mill dam, about two and a half miles from Amherst, burst Wednesday night carrying out about 2,000 logs. In going down stream they tore out part of Curran Bros' dam, and about 8,000 logs belonging to them were swept out to sea, very few of which will be saved.

The department of public works for Canada have stipulated that soft coal required for the Ottawa government buildings this year must be supplied from Nova Scotia mines.

Albert Frazier, foreman in Black Diamond mines at Westville, N. S., was killed by being crushed between the walls by a train of loaded boxes which went off the track.

The Yarmouth Cotton Duck Company have this year placed \$35,000 to rest, and pay a dividend of \$7,500.

In spite of the precautions thus far taken by the Halifax health officials diphtheria of a most malignant type is rapidly spreading in the city. Deaths are reported almost daily, and in several quarters the citizens are terrified at the inroads which the disease is making. The doctors do not report all the cases, and the proper officials refuse to fine the doctors and compel them to do their duty. All houses in which the disease is found are not placarded according to law, and stringent regulations to prevent the spread of the disease are not enforced. —Halifax Herald.

The steamer Ulunda is now beached at Westport. A wooden bottom is to be put on the steamer and in the course of about two weeks it is expected that she will be in the Halifax dry dock. Until then the extent of her damages cannot be accurately ascertained.

In the vicinity of Windsor, N. S., several valuable horses have been recently shot by unknown parties.

Steamer "Princess Beatrice," of the Halifax and P. E. Island line, which sailed from Halifax for Charlottetown and intermediate ports, ran ashore in a dense fog near Isaac's harbor. Passengers and crew saved.

The country is full of apple buyers, says the Kentville Star, and already shipments of early fruit have been made. Gravenstiens are running close to \$4 and \$3 is being offered for orchards of fruit.

OTHER PROVINCES.

A sixteen-year-old girl suicided at Winnipeg, out of vexation at her father's re-marriage.

At Cobourg, Ont., Sarah E. Larmer is in jail awaiting trial for setting fire to the house of her mother in the village of Grafton, with the intention of burning the house and its contents for the purpose of putting an end to her mother's existence in the flames.

An atrocious murder was committed Thursday night at Pointe du Lac, nine miles above Three Rivers, Que. As Mr. and Mrs. Gervais of that place were sitting at tea about seven o'clock some one fired through the window, killing Mrs. Gervais instantly. No cause can be assigned for the act.

The provincial exhibition at Charlottetown, P. E. I., which opens on the 30th inst., and will continue till October 3rd, promises to be the grandest affair of the kind ever held on the Island.

On Wednesday last 768 barrels of oysters were shipped from Summerside.

UNITED STATES.

The losses by the floods in Ellington and Broad Brook valley, Conn., Wednesday night amount to \$50,000.

At the termination of a revival meeting near Collerine, Ala., Sunday, about 100 negroes were poisoned from eating barbecued pork in which arsenic had been placed. Eight persons have died from poisoning and 20 others are in a critical condition.

Frost and rust have kept off the Aroostook potatoes up to the present time and the crop will be good.

Wednesday evening about one-third of the Broad Brook dam, in the town of Ellington, Conn., gave way, flooding the surrounding country, carrying away bridges and interrupting railway travel.

A wreck occurred on the Reading Pa., railroad, 17 miles above this place, Friday. The cars went into the river. According to one estimate, 40 or more bodies remain in the wreck or have been swept away by the current. 25 wounded and 13 dead have been taken out.

The starch factories in Aroostook, Me., will use over 2,000,000 bushels of potatoes this fall.

BRITISH AND FOREIGN.

Italy has sent troops to the frontier to protect the St. Gothard Railway.

A sad spectacle was witnessed in Santiago, Chili, recently, when hundreds of Italian immigrants, just arrived from Talcahuano, implored passers-by for alms, some of the men offering their coats and shirts for sale in order to procure something to eat.

An explosion in Maybach pit, Samet Wendel, Rhenish Prussia, and 25 admirers were killed. The other men in the pit to the number of 325, were rescued.

The Austrian warship Taurus, with a crew of 69 men and four officers, has been foundered in the Dead Sea.

A terrible accident happened on Friday on the Mexican railroad. Two trains going in opposite directions ran into each other at Rionada. The cars were piled up and completely wrecked. Ten persons were killed and wounded.

The Turkish man-of-war Ertogroul foundered at sea and 600 of the crew drowned. Osman Pacha and Ali Pacha, envoys of the Sultan to the Emperor of Japan, were among the drowned.

Advices from Hiogo state that the mail steamer Musashi Maru has been lost off Coochi and that all of her crew with the exception of one were drowned.

A family of eight persons were killed at Presburg, Hungary, by ignorantly eating the fruit of the night-shade plant.

A storm at Marseilles (Sunday) flooded many houses, caused great damage to railways and destroyed an immense amount of property in the environs.

Three persons were killed and several injured by the fall of a wall. Heavy rains and floods are reported in other parts of the south of France.

ALL SORTS.

It is said that about a thousand elk are killed yearly in Oregon and Washington, and that the antlers from most of them are sent to England for ornaments.

Garibaldi's tomb, in Caprera, is to be made a national monument, and the island is to be devoted to the purposes of a home for old sailors. A lighthouse will also be erected there.

The publications of every kind received during the year at the British Museum numbered about 40,000, which require a mile of new shelf room every two years.

Dakota has a 1,500-foot well, six inches in diameter, and throwing 4,000 gallons of water a minute. There are in that region wells 3,000 feet deep.

England's interest in Egypt is illustrated by the fact that of 3425 vessels which used the Suez Canal last year, 2611 were English. No other nation had more than 200 ships using the canal.

An English railway company is selling its old cars at \$25 a piece, and it is alleged that they are being purchased for conversion into cottages, bathing machines, and various other small habitations.

A diver who was working at the foundation of a railroad bridge near Boise City, Idaho, gave a signal to be hoisted quickly. When he got to the surface, he held fast a 65-pound salmon that he had caught by the gill.
